

## Fire Prevention Week in Halton Features Parade, Blitz, Contests

Reports on a "bigger-and-better-than-ever" Fire Prevention Week in Halton County, were submitted last week at the October meeting of the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau.

Delegates to the county bureau, in Halton, reported their individual campaigns during the October meeting of the Halton County Fire Prevention Week were well accepted by the public, and the county-wide programs sponsored by the Bureau were also enthusiastically received.

The Bureau kicked off their celebration of Fire Prevention week this year with a parade to St. Paul's United Church, Milton, on September 24. The Lorne Scots Military Band led about 50 fire fighters on the march.

### Poster Competition

Earlier in September, the Bureau opened its ninth annual poster competition for Grade Five students from all over Halton. Teachers will be submitting their best entries to local fire departments, and the top boy's and girl's poster in each town will be sent to the Toronto Fire Prevention Bureau for judging. The boy and girl submitting the best two posters from the county will be honored at a Fire Prevention Banquet November 23, when Toronto Fire Department Chief Frank G. Coppsell will be the guest speaker, and the winners will be presented with trophies in recognition of their achievement. Next spring the two Halton winners' posters will be entered in Armstrong, said he felt this an

ideal reminder to residents to check for fire hazards was an excellent idea. "Through the year people in schools, industries, businesses and homes are inclined to forget the little things that go with fire prevention," he added.

Elsewhere during Fire Prevention Week, individual fire departments conducted various programs to impress the need for fire safety on the public. Oakville Fire Department held an extra member demonstration for about 10 men representing local industries, conducted fire drills in schools and stepped up the home industrial and commercial inspections that are carried out regularly through the year.

Clement of Milton, Esquigen Deputy Reeve, Alfred Leslie, and Jack Armstrong representing the Georgetown Insurance Agents Association.

struction for the 11 and 12-year-olds in the church school which is being shared between Mr. Lynch and the rector.

The rector explained the reason that in fact even Sunday is laymen's Sunday because every Sunday the choir under the excellent leadership of Mrs. Quigley play a major part in the parish worship.

He added that even the responses of the congregation which most people take for granted are an important role played by the laymen in the worship of the church.
