

Lois Hunter, John McGee Win 4-H Inter-Club Competition

Lois Hunter, R.R. 1, Burlington and John McGee, R.R. 1 North representing the Haltom 4-H Grain Club, won the Provincial 4-H Field Crop Competition at the University of Guelph on Friday. A total of 55 teams from 4-H Grain, Corn, Forage, Tobacco and Raspberry Clubs from across the province competed for the Canadian Seed Trade Association Challenge Trophy.

Lois and John judged classes of oats, wheat, hay and corn silage, giving reasons on these classes and answering six questions on all phases of crop production and marketing. Out of a total of 520 points, John McGee scored 482, and Lois Hunter 464, for a team total of 946. South Wellington 4-H Corn Club was second, with 929 points. The Haltom 4-H Corn Club team of Elizabeth Nourington and

Bryan Marshall placed eleventh with 900 points. In the 4-H Beef Section, with 33 teams, Harold and Verna Thompson, representing the Haltom 4-H Beef Club placed third with 904 points, just eleven points behind the winning team from Middlesex. Verna had a score of 473, the second highest in the competition, with Harold scoring 431 points.

Sheep Section
In the 4-H Sheep Section, Bev Hoey and Don Harris from the Haltom 4-H Sheep Club were second with 897 points, just five points behind the winning Durham County team.

The largest competition of the day was in the 4-H Dairy section with 26 teams. The Haltom 4-H Jersey-Guernsey-Ayrshire Cull Club was represented by Nancy Beatty and Lorne Hla and placed 16th with 878 points.

At the conclusion of the competition a banquet was provided by the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Guest speaker was K. J. Lantz, Assistant Deputy Minister. Verna Thompson represented all the contestants at head table and expressed appreciation to everyone responsible for the competition.

The last Provincial 4-H Championship won by Haltom County was in 1957, with the 4-H Beef team of Bill Robinson and Lynne Coulter.

District Holstein Herd is Tops in County Records

The highest scoring Holstein herd on record of performance have been announced for the year ending February 29, 1965. The winners for herds with 20 or more records completed was George and L. H. Leaver, Campbellville. Their 23 records averaged 15,501 lbs. of milk, 560 lbs. of butterfat, 3.8%. This is a breed class average of 143 lbs. milk and 147 lbs. fat. Thus these cows have averaged over 40% higher than the average for all Holsteins of that age.

In third place was Tom H. McGee, R.R. 1 North - 23 records of 14,048 milk, 526 fat, 3.74%, for a B.C.A. of 135 and 138.

In the section for under 20 records, completed, C. Anderson, Terra Cotta had 19 records, 14,116 of milk, 548 of fat, 3.88%, for a B.C.A. of 135 and 141.

Next was Fred Nurse, R.R. 2 Georgetown - 11 records, 15,044 of milk, 548 of fat, 3.57%, with a B.C.A. of 140 and 137.

In third position was Howson Ruddle, R.R. 3, Georgetown - 13 records - 14,214 milk, 527 fat, 3.71%, for a B.C.A. of 135 and 136.

Certificates will be presented to these breeders at the annual meeting of the Haltom Holstein Club.

CAN A NONEXISTING BY-LAW BE AMENDED?

Did the Nagsagweya Council follow proper procedure when they passed by-law 1845?

The Council of Nagsagweya has justified and still does justify the way in which they passed this shocking document.

In spite of 107 written objections to the Ontario Municipal Board...

And even in spite of the fact that the entire council present last Wednesday night suddenly and meekly agreed to rescind this very by-law...

The question now being asked by the people of this Township is this...

When worried people questioned this by-law, this Council stood united as one to justify and defend every detail.

What then made every single member present at this council, reverse his position on this single night? What made them unanimously vote to rescind this by-law?

Was every single member present suddenly converted to the side of the people and to proper parliamentary procedure on this magical night?

Is this Council now prepared to follow proper Parliamentary procedure?

The Council voted unanimously three times to rescind this by-law. The by-law therefore ceased to exist. Whereupon a second motion (this one completely out of order) was made to send this very same by-law to their Planning Board for amendments...

The question of course is, how can a non-existent by-law be passed?

And the most important question is...

Has this Council rescinded this by-law because they are now convinced that they were wrong and that this crippling by-law would really harm the people of this township?

Or is this merely a temporary, political move to take the heat off themselves (with the Town

Board hold public meetings, or publish information, in order to gain the cooperation and help of the people of this Township...

Did this Council or its Planning Board draw up any plans suitable for adoption by each of the villages in this Township?

Did this Council or its Planning Board meet with the Boards of each of the villages having jurisdiction in their areas, to discuss plans or proposals relating to this by-law that would seriously affect everyone of these villages?

The fact is that neither the Council of the Township of Nagsagweya nor its Planning Board followed any of the above procedures, and yet Section 10 of the "Planning Act of Ontario" clearly states that every one of the above procedures shall be carried out.

Offer Planting Assistance

The Haltom Region Conservation Authority announced this week that landowners within the watershed wishing assistance for tree planting in the spring of 1967 should apply soon.

This program is designed to encourage tree planting on privately-owned lands. If acceptable, the Authority will provide the necessary men and equipment free of charge to plant all species except Scotch Pine. The landowners must, however, agree to plant a minimum of 2,000 trees, must pay for his trees (obtained from the

Department of Lands and Forests at \$10 per thousand), and must obtain a tree planting plan from the Department of Lands and Forests, R.R. 1, Hespeler, Ontario.
