pion this week, Milton Juniors spent over \$1,100 for backey sticks last season. Ice time cost the club \$1,000 and it's estimated over \$50 was spent purchasing pucks. Tape, an indispensible item used for everything from wrapping around sticks to holding uniforms together, was a \$125 expenditure. And they are just some of the items involved. No mention is made of the high cost of travel, insurance and doctor bills which often add up into sizeable amounts. The Milton team played 54 games last season, another figure

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

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
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
