At a special meeting of Halton County Council held Thursday afternoon of last week:

● Councillors learned Stanley Wright of Georgetown had been chosen from 17 applicants to fill the position of assistant superintendent at Halton Central Manor.

● By-laws authorizing the expropriation of land needed for the widening of Five Sideroad and the Campbellville Road north of Mohawk Roadway, were given the necessary reading and approved. Reeve William Coulter of Nassagaweya complained one of the residents involved was upset because a county agent had not contacted him as promised, and Roads Committee chairman Reeve George Leslie promised to straighten the problem out.

● An invitation was accepted to attend the official opening of the new Nassagaweya Township Administration Building Nov. 20.
