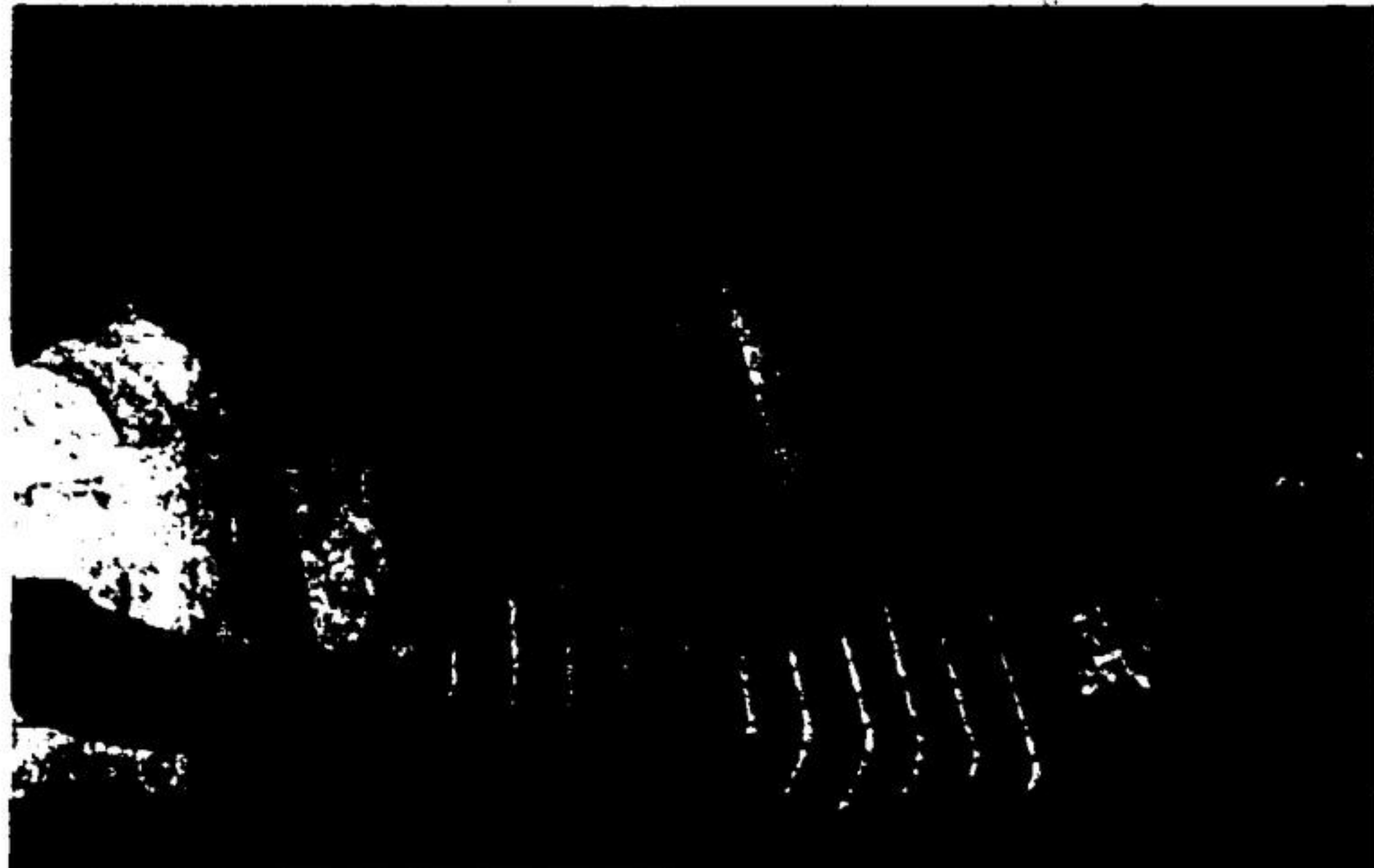

## English-Style Fox Hunt Held Saturday 55 Ride to Hounds at Style Acres

The tongueing of hounds, mixed with the shrill blasts of the hunt master's horn, broke the silence throughout a 900-acre area surrounding Style Acres Ranch Saturday afternoon as an English-style fox hunt was staged with 55 taking part.

Members of the Eglinton Hunt Club and Caledon Riding School, attired in traditional riding habits, followed hunt master Major Charles M. Kenderley, R.R. 1, Terra Cotta, through the rugged terrain in search of fox.

Although just one fox was sighted, the hunters enjoyed a perfect cutting for over three hours riding horseback as hounds led them on a merry chase through bush, over hill and down dale, after rabbits as well as fox.

Some wore the customary pink jackets with black toppers while others were dressed in black jackets and toppers. As one interested spectator put it aptly, "It was a sight to behold!"

Major Kenderley, himself an expert horseman and hunter, led the pack of hunters and sounded the hunting horn periodically to keep both hounds and hunters on the track. Club members considered the territory one of the finest hunt areas in the district. One fox was sighted and five chases made when the hounds scented jack rabbits.
