125 Teachers Attend

Workshop on New Mathematics

With the co-operation of D. E. Kennedy, superintendent of the Ontario School for the Deaf, Milton, Public School inspectors W. L. McNeil and O. G. McDowell organized a successful workshop on New Mathematics for the benefit of the Primary teachers of North Halton, East Flamboro and Waterdown.

The workshop was conducted by E. E. Smith, assistant superintendent of the Professional Development Branch of the Department of Education with the capable assistance of Mrs. Mildred Stankie, Mrs. Pearl Walpole and Mrs. Helen Johnston, all primary supervisors of Toronto Township.

One hundred and twenty-five teachers who are responsible for

the introduction of the New Approach into Kindergarten, Grade One, Two and Three this year, assembled for two-hour sessions on Mathematics on October 20 and 27.

The general theme of the first meeting was the importance of the use of concrete materials and the discovery approach applicable to all three grades. At the second session, the importance of the early introduction (at the kindergarten level) of the Number Line, the concept of inequalities, and counting procedures was emphasized.

"A narrow and dangerous portion" of the Nassagaweya - Puslinch Town Line was the subject of a petition signed by several ratepayers, which was received Monday evening by the Nassagaweya council.

Councillors noted the particular portion of the road referred to in the petition, is a section looked after by Puslinch Township and they immediately asked Township Clerk J. C. McIvor to send the petition to Puslinch, requesting that improvements be made.

A small section of land, about 20 feet by 40 feet was sold by the Township to Mrs. Redgrave at a price of \$1. Mrs. Redgrave and her husband own the former McLean property on the Guelph Line, north of Brookville. The land had been purchased by the Township from the original property owner many years ago for the construction of Township sheds but the sheds have since been torn down.

The road superintendent's voucher for \$2,000.00 and general accounts totalling \$410.00 were also approved.

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

Here is an interesting hand that occurred at the Action Bridge Club last week. Neither side was vulnerable and the dealer was North.

North
S-764
H-A 13

West East

The bidding:
North East South West
Pass Pass 1 N T Pass
3 N T All Pass

May I quickly point out that I don't agree with this bidding. But how else can I account for three Souths getting to three no trump?

However I'm not interested in the bidding. I am interested in the play. Now this is a duplicate hand and point is not just to make the contract but to make as many tricks as possible.

West leads the three of hearts. Cover the East-West hands and plan your play. Did you play the heart jack - good. Usually this is not the right play but this time it is needed for a quick entry. Now clubs is the suit to attack. What card do you play from dummy? I saw one declarer lead the jack. This is a good play if you want to repeat a finesse but this time you don't expect to repeat finesse and in fact the suit is not solid enough if the jack is covered.

As you can see, the jack is covered by East singleton queen and declarer must lose two clubs before the suit is established.

The proper lead from dummy is a low club. East plays the queen and you win with the ace. Now you lead a low club from south's hand and play the club eight in dummy. Either this wins or East has the king left and must play it.

Of course if East started with the queen and nine of clubs, and played the queen on the first round, you have been fooled but how many defenders could play like that?

Once you have cleared up the club situation you are home free. With four club tricks, two diamonds, three hearts, and two spades you can take eleven tricks. Naturally you try the spade finesse, since all other suits are stopped. Even if you miss guess the club situation you should come by ten tricks. In duplicate bridge every trick counts. The declarer who lead the jack of clubs from dummy, had it covered by the queen decided to duck. After that the best this declarer could do was nine tricks. This was good for zero points on the duplicate scoring system.
