



Pounding the SPORTS BEAT

THE 1965-66 EDITION of the Tanners stands poised on the threshold of another season with several practices under their belts but a lot of questions still unanswered. Friday night's game in Fergus might solve some of the problems for coach Junior Beaumont when he's able to observe first hand how the Acton club will do against opposition.

Next Tuesday the club was supposed to make the jaunt to Durham to open the season there but the game's been postponed. By the time the Tanners make their first appearance at home they'll have played one game anyway. They should give the coach a good idea of how well many of the new faces who've been trying out with the team play under fire. Several of them have impressed at practice sessions but it takes the bumps and grind of a game to separate the men from the boys.

Friday's opener in Fergus will be watched with much interest. Rumors have been rife with spotty information about the personnel of the Flyers who were a mere shadow of their previous selves last year. According to the same grapevine Flyers have also picked up three or four players from last year's Elmira team which would strengthen them considerably without Dobbie, McCabe and Knott. Main obstacle the Fergus club will have to face again this season is indifference.

People in Fergus will travel miles to see a game of lacrosse but it's an effort for them to go across the street for a hockey contest. It's downright discouraging for the team and those responsible for running it when only a handful of people show up for a game as well as being hard on the coffers. However, hockey circles in Fergus seem to have developed an immunity to indifference. They carry on year after year.

MINOR HOCKEY launched another season both in the Tri-County and the Legion town league last week and it looks like it's going to be the best year yet for both organizations. The Novices started out like a house on fire with an 11-0 whitewash job on Fergus Thursday and their victory could be an omen of a big improvement in the Acton teams this season.

Hunters Chasing Deer Drivers Making Kills

There have been a few reports of deer being shot in Halton's three-day open season this week, but motorists are doing a lot to reduce the abundant deer population with their cars.

Motorists killed one Saturday and two more Sunday on the district highways. A fourth was killed Tuesday, on the second day of the hunt. They were killed on Highway 7 near the Fourth Line Esqueving, on Highway 401 near the Eighth Line Oakville, on Highway 25 south of 25 Sideroad Esqueving, and on the Eighth Line Esqueving below 10 Sideroad.

The four vehicles involved sustained a total of \$850 damage to their cars.

Last Wednesday's announcement of the three-day open season in the county and surrounding counties was greeted with alarm by farm owners — who would like to see the deer population lowered, but feared for their own safety when the influx of hunters began. Dozens of farmers hurried out to purchase signs to post on their property, and a lot of good hunting land in Halton was closed off by signs by the time the season opened Monday morning. This was Halton's first open season in the last nine years.
