

# Water Deposit Upped by Council Sixth Police Officer Approved

In future, newcomers to town must pay a \$15 deposit for use of town water in place of the present \$8 consumer deposit. This was finalized Tuesday evening by council when an amendment to the present by-law was approved.

Consumer deposits are required prior to water services being turned on. In the event any consumer's account is in arrears when they move, the deposit is deducted from the bill. If an account is paid in full at this time, the consumer receives the full amount of the deposit back.

Councilor Frank Oakes arrived on the scene carrying a coal oil lantern which he plopped on council table. He was followed by Acton's reeve, H. H. Hinton carrying a candle in a holder.

**Blow, Snuff, Switch**  
The experience of conducting a council session by these unfamiliar lights didn't transpire. Prior to the regular session beginning, the lights came on again and the lantern was blown out, candle snuffed out and flashlights turned off.

While council was in session, the buzzing of a motor starting and stopping was heard within the confines of the police office across the hall from council chambers. It was learned later that an auxiliary lighting system had been brought by Milton O.P.P. for use in the Acton office in the event the power interruption continued. Milton O.P.P. office was in darkness from around 5:30 until near 8 p.m.
