

Many at Cenotaph Sunday For Remembrance Service

The new practice of holding the Remembrance Day service on the preceding Sunday, rather than on the exact date, continued this year with well-attended observances at Acton and district cenotaphs and with special services in churches.

The memorial notes of the Last Post sounded at the cenotaph before a large crowd of paradees and church-going spectators. The parade to the hill of monument began about 10:30 a.m. and included many veterans in Legion uniforms, Legion Ladies' Auxiliaries, Cub Scouts, Guides and Brownies, and other representatives from various other organizations.

Parade marshal was Legion president Jim Gunn, who gave the Legion charge. John McHugh read the names from the cenotaph.

March band led by Keith members of the Legion Scouts, including William Taylor and Patrick Dunne of Acton, flanked the cenotaph.

The special paper flag, temporary and permanent, was lowered at the notes of the Last Post by Dr. J. J. Buchanan and then slowly raised again as Reveille as all ways stirred the hearts of the listeners. Frank Simons played the bugle. Flags of the color party dipped and then flew high again.
