### OBITUARY

#### Senator Collapses On-Visit to Wife

Senator Norman Platt Lambert, who headed the Liberal party organization during the famous year of W. L. Mackenzie King, died in Ottawa, Thursday, November 4.

Mr. Lambert, 81, collapsed while visiting his wife, Jessie, in St. Vincent hospital for the aged and chronically ill. He died later in Civic hospital, Ottawa.

Mrs. Lambert, the former Jessie Florence McLean, lived in Acton when her parents operated a general store where the Bank of Montreal is now.

President of the National Liberal Federation from 1935-40, Mr. Lambert was active in the party's headquarters organization for many years before and after his term of office.

Appointed by the then prime minister Mackenzie King to a seat in the Senate in 1938, he was a figure in national capital planning.

Mr. Lambert also was a strong advocate of electoral reform, including compulsory voting.

A journalist and layman economist, Lambert was on the staff of the Toronto Globe from 1909 to 1911.

He also contributed to a column called The Spotlight in The Star in 1921 and 1922 while secretary of the Canada Council of Agriculture.

Mr. Lambert left the Globe to go to Winnipeg where he served a brief term as associate editor of The Grain Growers' Guide before taking on the secretaryship of the CCA.

His father, J. A. Lambert, a staunch Conservative, was editor of a weekly newspaper in Mount Forest, The Representative.

Born in Mount Forest, Lambert was graduated from the University of Toronto in 1908.

He is survived by his wife, Jessie, three sons of Toronto and a daughter, Lois Lambert of Ottawa.

Funeral service and interment were in Ottawa, Monday, November 8.
