Seating is still at a premium and old chairs would be welcome.

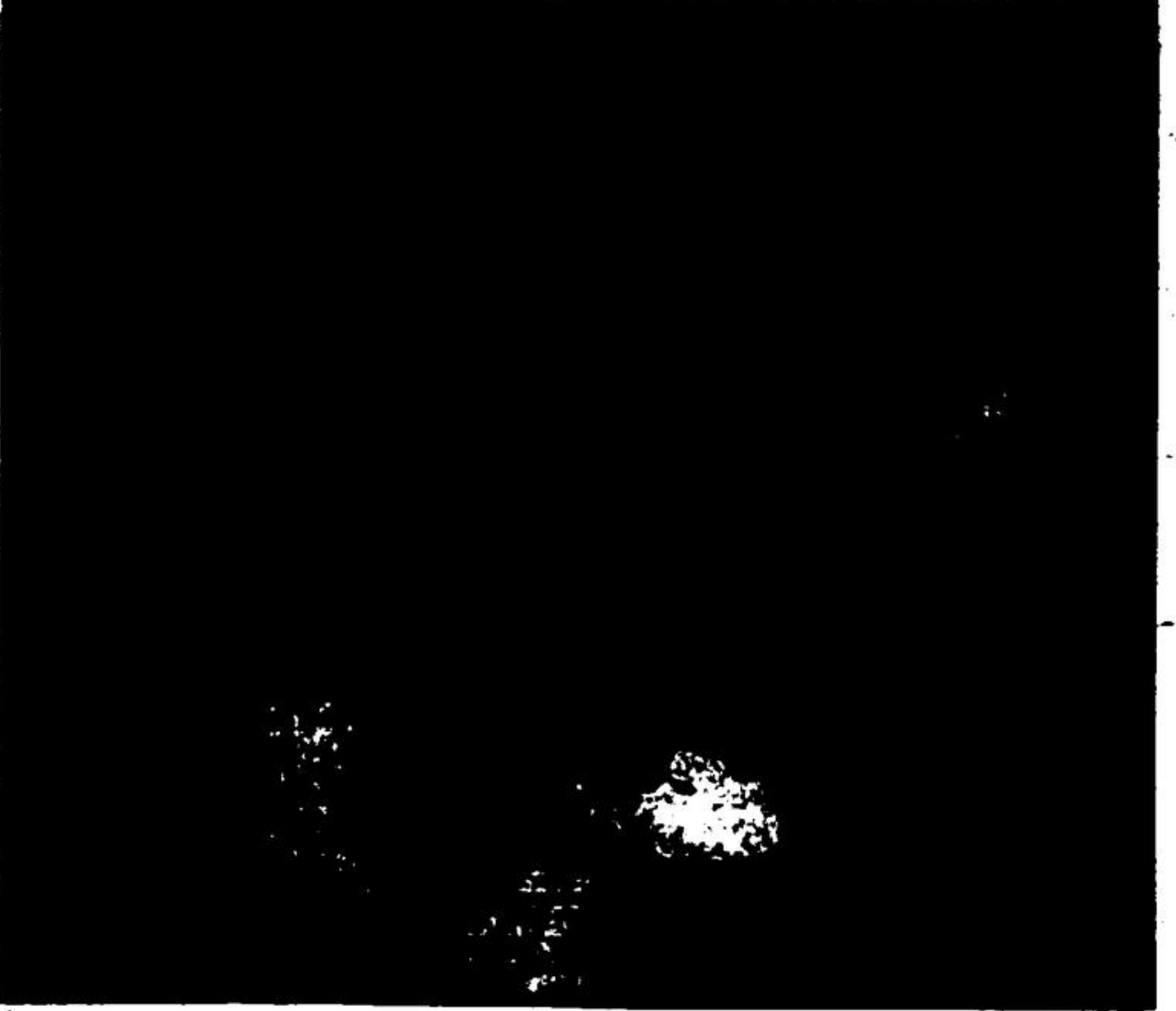
Car Overtakes
