Establishment of a new county roads maintenance centre outside Milton and the construction of highway 25 straight south from highway five at Palerme were among the recommendations in a Roads-Maintenance Study presented to Halton County Council during the regular meeting of last week. The report prepared by Dennis & Sons was outlined by their representative Peter Hunt during the meeting. It followed a letter from the Department of Highways to the council in 1963.

The major recommendation in the report to County Council is the increase in the mileage of the present county road system by 174 miles.
