Stop and Think...

Annually the citizens of Acton have an opportunity of making their feelings known on how municipal business is being conducted. This opportunity is presented next Tuesday, December 7. Votes cast that day will determine the representatives chosen to administer the municipality and schools for 1966.

For thinking people of Acton it is a day of decision, the day set aside where in complete privacy the voter can indicate his personal choice. Wind, sleet, snow or rain should not keep the responsible citizen from exercising his democratic privilege. It is at the municipal level that this democratic privilege becomes a personal duty and responsibility. It is at this level of government that the citizen comes in close contact with the democratic system all during the year.

With this democratic privilege there is also a responsibility. It is the responsibility of the elector to decide which of the candidates will serve the town of Acton best. The representative selected must not necessarily be someone you know or have heard of, or someone you think might be a good fellow, someone who hasn't offended you, or someone who may not offend you. The candidate you select for the privilege of your vote must be the one who can do the best for Acton, someone who can anticipate and

is not hesitant of the momentous changes that will affect Acton's future development, someone who will determine and move into the bold action that will be required in municipal government.

It is important that our elected representatives are prepared to meet the decisions that will be required on a system of regional government on the completed County roads needs study, on the regional detention centre on the Central Ontario Transportation study and on education administration. Such are almost upon us.

It is unfortunate in our opinion that once again we are electing municipal representatives for only a one-year term. We feel that a plebiscite on a two-year term should have been held this year. However it is possible that next year's election may see fit to present it to the electors next year. The system is apparently satisfactory in many other municipalities.

Regularly we've urged ratepayers to get out and vote. This appears to be a good idea even if the ratepayer did not have any idea of what he was voting for. This year we'll suggest you get out and vote only if you know what you're doing. If you don't know what you're doing, stay at home and let the responsible electors who have considered and studied the issues and candidates elect the most progressive and responsible municipal government in Acton's history.

50 YEARS AGO

Taken from the issue of the Free Press, Thursday, Dec. 7, 1916.

Church members of the Presbyterian churches have voted against it. The vote in Knox church, Acton, was as follows: elders, for 7, against 4; members, for 64 against 171; adherents, for 23, against 45. Total, for 94, against 220. There was a favorable vote in the west and in the east, but the opposition is now seen to be strong.

This week 230,600 pages of news were printed at the Free Press plant. The Acton paper has 16 pages with a press run of 2100. The Milton paper has 28 pages in four sections with a run of over 5,000. The Dundas weekly which is printed here has 10 pages with a run of 3,500 and the Holland News, a paper printed here in Dutch, has four pages with a run of 3,000. Election and Christmas ads packed the pages.

Press operators Will McEachern and Hub Marshall just kept riling them out on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and early this morning.

The county council picture in Halton is unsettled. In Acton there is an election for both of the posts which send representatives to Milton. There is already one new member in Deputy Reeve Charles Menets of Milton. In nearly every other municipality the Reeves and Deputies Reeves are being challenged for their seats. Two definite losses are Reeve C. A. Martin of Milton who is retiring and Reeve John Elliott of Georgetown who is stepping up to challenge the mayoralty.

A goodly number of citizens turned out to the Nominating meeting on Friday night in Acton. At 8:30 the following were nominated for the various offices: Reeve, Charles Kirkness, W. J. O. Oakes, J. M. McDonald, J. H. Davies, J. H. Creighton, J. H. Boulton, councillors, Fred Davidson, Claude Cook, W. J. Benson, J. H. Masters, J. H. Creighton, Leonard Lovell, W. J. Oakes, John Hargrave, J. H. Boulton, Alex. McLain, A. Mason, school board, W. H. Clayton, J. Chapman, Chas. Kirkness, Frank Oakes, G. A. Dills, public utilities commissioner, C. M. Hansen.

J. R. MacArthur was selected chairman, Reeve J. M. McDonald declared Acton was the best municipality in Ontario with the best spirit of cooperation. He cited the War Services League which has raised \$18,000 for the members of the services.

Chairman V. B. Rumley of the school board stated a kindergarten had been started during the past year and he felt it was a wonderful thing. Some rooms are overcrowded. Trustee E. S. Blow said some parts of the school were not in very good shape and he was looking forward to these improving.

When nine o'clock came on Saturday evening, it was found an election for Reeve and council would be necessary. For Reeve, Elijah Davies and Charles Kirkness; for council, W. J. Benson, Claude Cook, J. H. Creighton, Frederick Davidson, Eli Masters and W. J. O. Oakes.

Property owners will also receive another ballot. They vote in favor of installing, constructing, erecting and maintaining the building, machinery, plant and equipment necessary for a complete sewerage system and sewage disposal plant at the estimated cost of \$184,000?
