#### Trust Companies Quite Safe

### Halton, Peel Trust President Scores Unfavorable Publicity

Despite unfavorable publicity toward trust companies in recent months, such firms are considered quite safe for both depositors and investors. O. E. Manning of Burlington, president of the Halton and Peel Trust and Savings Company, said in an address to the Oakville Chamber of Commerce last week:


"And, contrary to what some people believe, interest charged by trust companies averages between 6% and 7% per cent. In the mortgage contract under an amortized loan, when we show a seven per cent interest rate we are required to show in the contract that interest is not charged in advance. Therefore the borrower pays only seven percent, not some higher rate which would be the case if the interest was collected in advance," he pointed out.

The firm, founded 10 years ago by Mr. Manning, now has seven offices (including one in Milton) doing business of \$50,000,000 since its inception.
