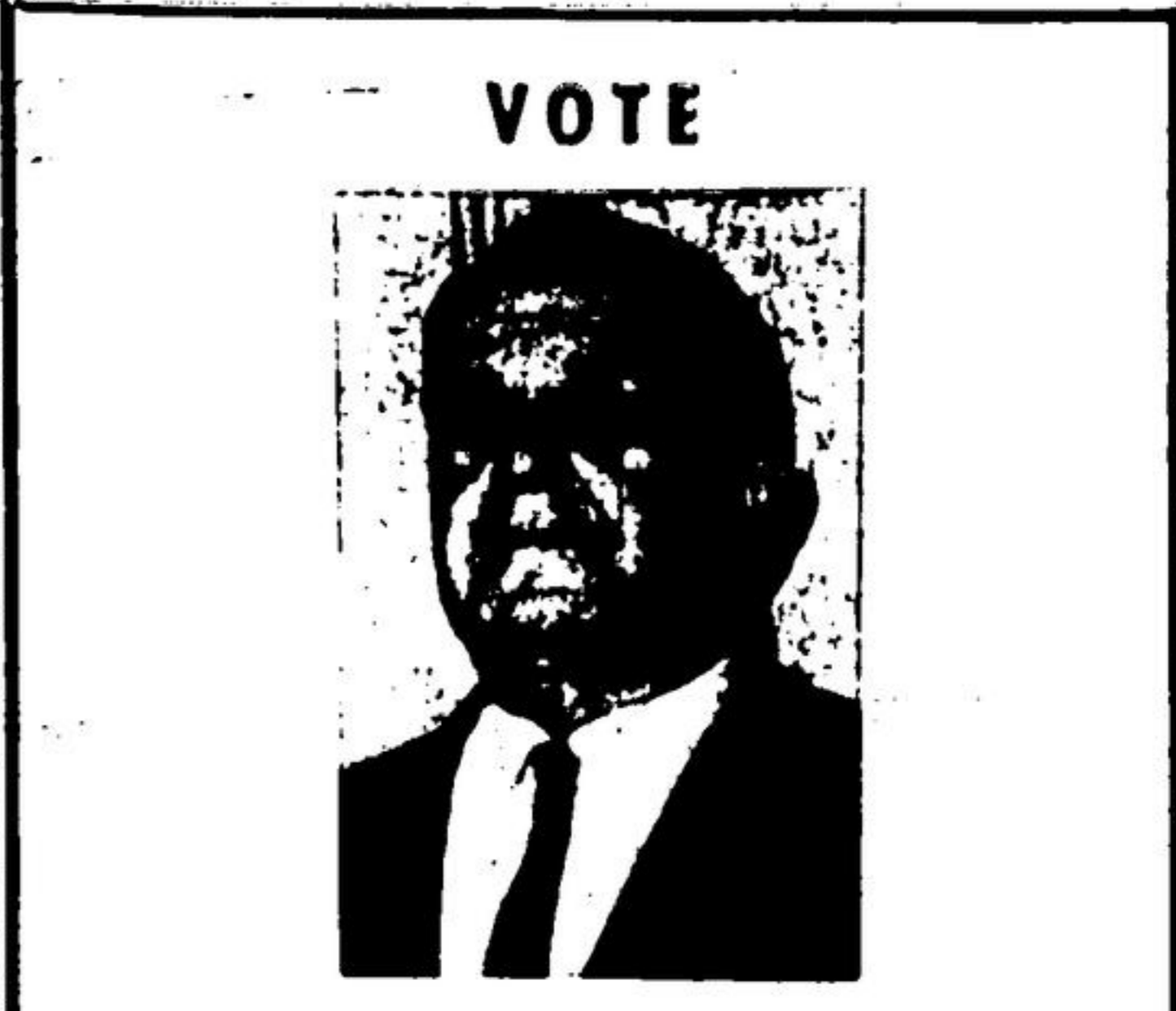
Big Four
