Three Days of Prayer Mark Close of Council

A Triduum of prayer and penitence in thanksgiving for blessings received and attainment of holiness in the Second Vatican Council, which came to a conclusion on Wednesday, December 10, was celebrated at St. Joseph's church, Acton, by the pastor, Father V. J. Morgan, and the parishioners.

The annual meeting of the Altar Guild of St. Albinus' church was held Monday evening in the parish hall. The officers for the coming year are: president, Mrs. C. Winn; secretary, Mrs. H. Denby; treasurer, Mrs. C. Nelles; flower convenor, Mrs. C. Leatherland.

Pope Paul had asked for three days of special prayer to be observed. Fast and abstinence of December 7 could also be offered for the intentions of the Holy Father. These are in thanksgiving for the blessings of the Council and to ask for the continued assistance of the Holy Spirit in the inner renewal of Catholic life spelled out in the decrees and declarations of the Council.

Pope Paul recently warned against "a spirit of criticism and even of indolence and rebellion" which is "calling into question norms of Christian life . . . that are sacrosanct." The renewal to which the Council is inviting people is not to be thought of as a blunting of the temporal moral code of the modern Catholic, but rather as something that increases his energy, makes him more aware of his duties.

Pope John admonished on the eve of the Council opening, "It is a command and a sacred duty to place holiness, both of clergy and laity, at the base of every effort to develop the energies of the church." We do not hesitate to say that all our care and zeal to make the Council productive of great results could remain useless if this collective effort towards holiness were to lack unanimity and resolution.
