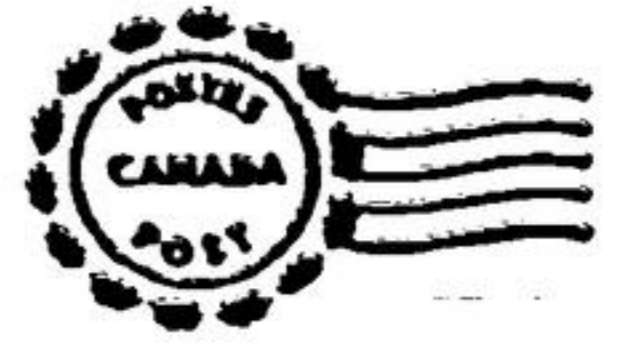
B. of M. Report

Assets Nudging \$5 Billion

Loans of well over \$3 billion and an assets figure nudging \$5 billion are highlights of the Bank of Montreal's 144th annual statement for the year ended October 31. The figures were announced by Edward Pratt, manager of the Acton branch.
He said loans totalled \$3,168 million, while assets stood at \$4,997 million. And, the bank reached new peaks in deposits and earnings, he reported.
Total deposits reached a new high of \$4,605 million, including Canadians' personal savings of \$2,167 million. These savings show an increase of \$137 million over the 1962 figure.
The total loan figure of \$3,168 million includes an increase of \$456 million in the key category "commercial and other loans."
The bank's net earnings, on operations of more than 970 offices in Canada and abroad, also set a new record at \$18,730,353, the manager reported. The earnings figure is an increase of \$875,470 from 1962. Provision for taxes is \$19,410,311.
The bank's 24,000 shareholders

are receiving \$2.2715 per share, or a total of \$13,220,625. This is 7 1/2 cents a share more than in 1962.
The manager said that "quick" assets amounted to \$1,259 million, reflecting a strong liquid position.
