Blake Inglis rifled in four goals and collected two assists as Acton Tanners' downed Durham Huskies 8-6, here, last Friday night in a fast, rugged W.O.A.A. game in front of 400 fans.

With first place at stake the Tanners dominated play through the contest, scoring two in the first period, three in the second and third. Huskies, W.O.A.A. Int-C major champs, rallied from a 5-2 deficit as they went into the final stanza to whip four goals home but were still two short.

It was the first win for the Tanners over the Durham club in two seasons. The victory, Acton's sixth against one loss, kept them even with Hespeler in the jostling for first place in the five team Int-B circuit.

Sweeney Sparkles
 Jim Sweeney turned in his best performance of the season on the Huskies who were beaten at point blank range on four occasions while the Tanners played short-handed. Sweeney took goals off the sticks of veteran Andy Grant and Jim Nixon in the first period and robbed Lawrence and Alkin in the final 20. The Acton barber wore a mask which seemed to give him the confidence he appeared to lack in a couple of previous encounters.

Jim Nixon, busting forward for the Huskies was Sweeney's chief antagonist. Glistening linemate Ross Graham, former pro with Springfield Indians of the A.H.L., Nixon bagged five goals and assisted on Graham's marker. He spearheaded the Durham attack along with Graham and Andy Grant.

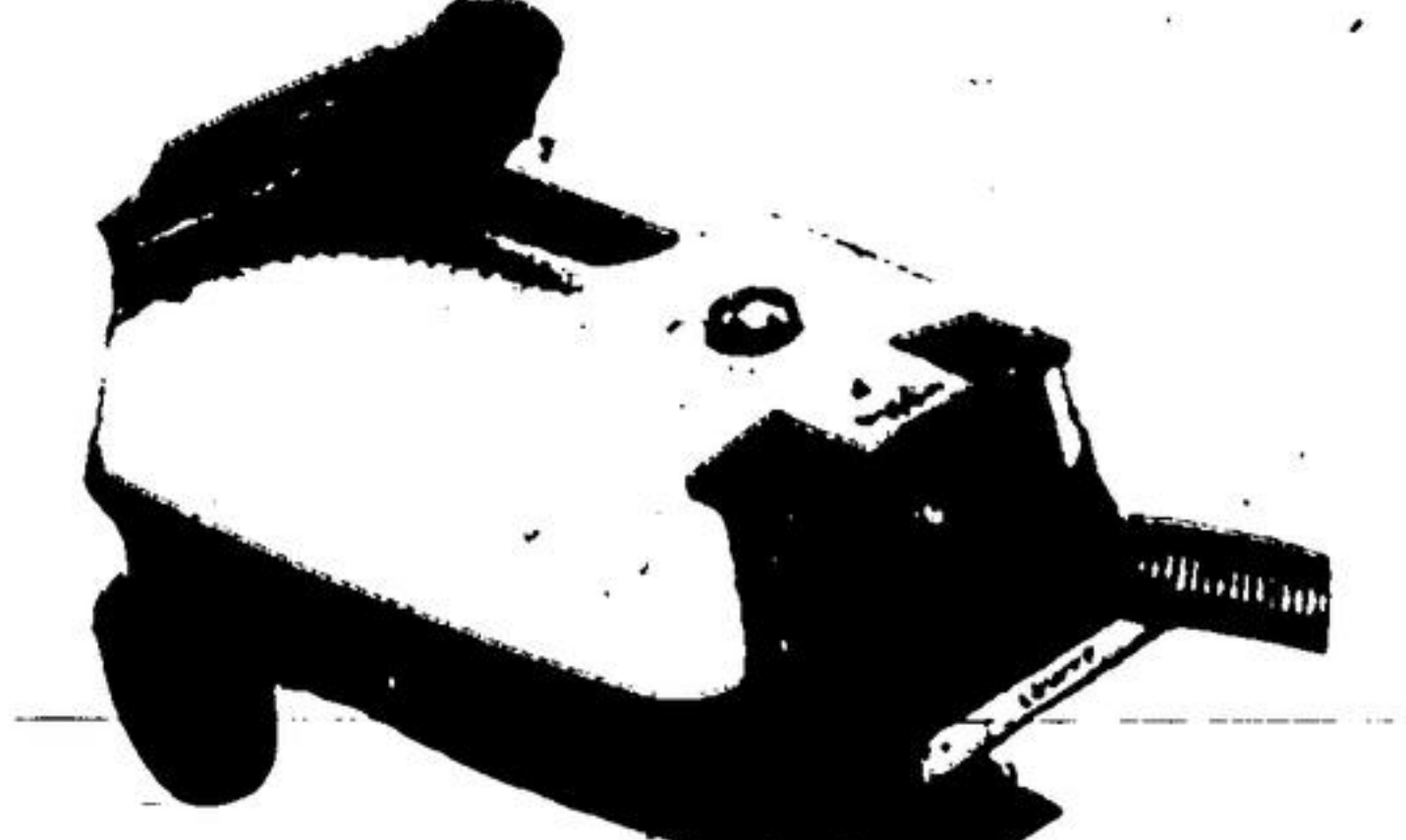
