## St. Alban's Christmas Pageant To be on January 2 in Church

On January 2 beginning at 7 p.m. with Evensong, St. Alban's Church School will for the third time put on its Christmas pageant under the supervision of Mrs. E. G. Franklin and Ernie Coker, the school's superintendent. There will be a party for the church school in the parish hall following the performance.

This year, for the first time, the pageant will take place in the church itself.

This will be a novelty for the parish but the parish church is the traditional place for the performance of the "mysteries" of the Christian Faith. The world famous annual "Passion Play" at Oberammergau reminds one of this fact. For centuries the church of Christ has been the sanctuary itself, have been the church's "stage" for the performance of religious drama.

"I. S. Eliot wrote such a drama called 'Murder in the Cathedral' whenever his play is produced, if a church is not used, then stage setting is made to resemble the interior of a church. In Toronto at Holy Trinity Church, Trinity Square, the Christmas Nativity Play has been produced in the church and sanctuary for over a quarter of a century. Recently, a famous Episcopalian (Anglican) Church in New York city, St. Clement's, located near the theatre district of the city, has entirely given over the chancel and sanctuary space permanently for the performance of religious drama. On Sundays in that parish the Holy Eucharist is celebrated "on stage" with short drama in place of the usual sermon. Some of the productions of St. Clement's have won praise from the artistic world in which the parish is situated.

St. Alban's is not doing anything very shocking then in placing the setting of its Nativity play in the local church. Religious drama is one of the very best ways of coming to grips with the message of the Gospel for one not only hears the words of Holy Scripture but one also sees them transformed before one's eyes into flesh and blood as it were into the forces and tensions which make up real life.

Parishioners of St. Alban's are especially encouraged to be present this year to witness the great work of the church school to see their own children in action. Play has been produced in the chancel and sanctuary for over a quarter of a century. Recently, a
