## Council Table Crowded New Members Observe

Acton council table Tuesday night was literally surrounded for the last meeting of the year when four new members who take over offices the first of the year joined with 1965 councillors to become acquainted with procedure.

Joining with present members were deputy reeve R. R. Parker and newly elected councillors Hamilton Peal, Earl Massey and C. T. Leatherland. Sitting in at their last meeting were retiring members Ray Arctic, Albert Irwin, Mrs. Doris Fayer and deputy reeve Roy Goodwin.

### Appreciation

Mayor Les Duby welcomed the new members and expressed sincere appreciation to retiring members for their excellent work during the past year. Verbal bouquets were handed out around the table to all retiring members as well as to the mayor and clerk administrator from retiring members.

Councillor Ray Arctic chairman of the road committee, handed over a brief outlining work which was not completed during 1965 and suggested the new council might give serious consideration to completion of these projects.

### Unfinished Business

The road chairman stated several projects had been under consideration for this year but it had been impossible to complete everything. Among the unfinished business were completion of the Ajax C.N.R. crossing, installation of the 12 inch watermain on Mill Street, a progressive type of sewer clearing program, graveling and grading of all road shoulders with a possibility of installing asphalt in these areas, asphalting of school walkways, repairing the sidewalk from Church Street to Agnes street, installation of a sidewalk along Elizabeth Drive to Main St. N., a drainage improvement program along Peel and Arthur Streets, continuation of ditch work throughout Lakeside subdivision and consideration of rectifying a drainage problem along Maria Street.

Mr. Arctic also asked serious consideration for a retirement program for town workers; there are a few who have served the town well and still are, but these men were reaching a retirement age and should be given some consideration.

He also recommended that the 1965 council give serious thought to the past 35 years, was quite popular with the younger citizens as well as many older residents.
