Editor Joe Lake was Buried at Sea

Joseph B. Lake, a weekly news- paperman who worked at the Ac- ton Free Press from 1903 to 1907, died aboard a Norwegian liner Dec. 19 while on a cruise to South Africa. Mr. Lake, who was 88, re- tired when he sold the weekly newspaper he founded, the Powas- san News. He has since travelled extensively with his second wife.

Last year they visited the Brit- ish Isles. They were to visit Mrs. Lake's relatives in Capetown, South Africa.

He spent 65 years in the news- paper world and worked four of these years in the back shop of the Free Press on Mill St. when H. P. Moore was publisher.

He was born in Grilla and lived at Seaforth for a while before moving with his family to George-

town when he was 12. At the age of 14 he joined the staff of the Georgetown Herald as an apprentice. A niece is Mrs. Walter Bich, wife of the present editor of the Herald.

Next he moved to Acton and spent four years here, leaving in 1903 for Powassan where he found- ed the Powassan News. He was editor of the paper, mayor for 13 years and active in most of the Powassan organizations at the same time. He held the paper for 57 years before selling it and re- tiring two years ago.

He lived in H. P. Moore's home (now W. J. Beatty's) while work- ing in Acton, and declared Mr. Moore's influence helped mold his life. He could remember playing in the Acton band with Charlie Mason as bandmaster.

His wife, with whom he raised five girls and four boys, was an Acton girl, Mary Abraham, and died over eight years ago. One of his daughters is married to Hal- ton County Court Judge Alan Sprague. His four sons are Frank- lin of Noranda, Joseph and George of Powassan, and James of Cameron Falls, and five daugh- ters, Mary, whose husband is Judge Sprague of Oakville, Mrs. Oliver Becky (Eileen) of Rus- sel, Mrs. Sid Ashburn (Dorothy) of Toronto, Mrs. Charles Adams
