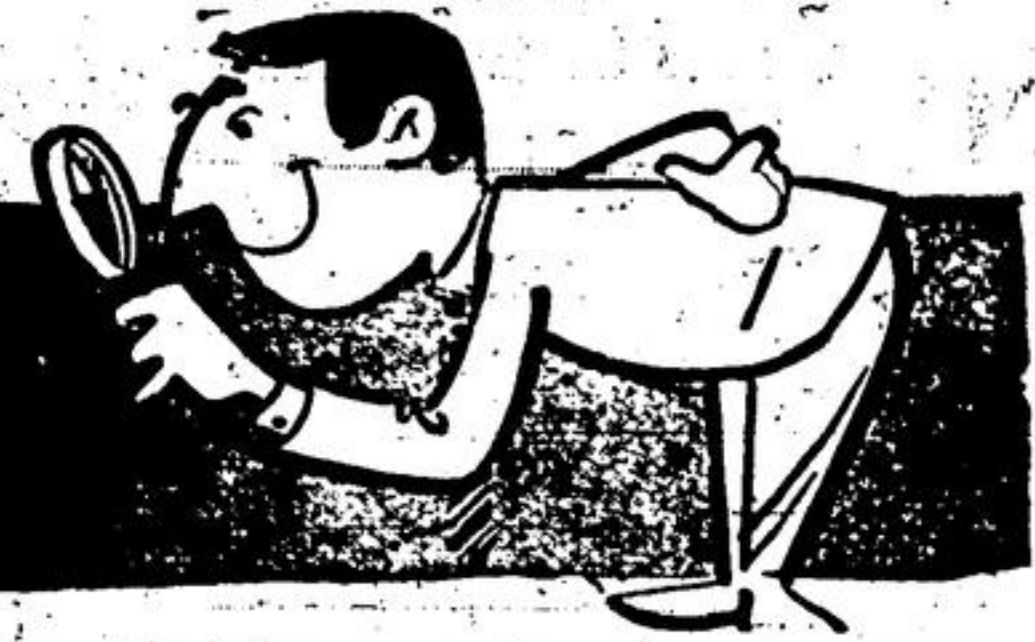

Name New Manor For Dr. Carl Martin

The new county home for the aged, under construction, adjacent to Halton Centennial Manor, was officially christened "Martin House" by members of Halton County Council on Tuesday, December 21, in honor of Dr. C. A. Martin, Milton.

Warden Herb Merry noted the name was chosen not only to honor the retiring Milton reeve for his long and hard work on the project, but also because it would represent the oldest name in Milton. Members of the committee felt the name was preferable to other suggestions, such as Sunset Villa.

It was pointed out the province requires the new unit to bear a separate name from that of Halton Manor.

The new unit now under construction will provide accommodation for 150 with provision for further additions to a maximum of 300.

Halton Centennial Manor was named to honor the county's centennial in 1954. Dr. Martin was a member of the Manor Board of Management during its first expansion in the 1950's. More recently, as Reeve of Milton, he served from mid-1962 to date on the board. He was chairman in 1964.

"I would like to mention our planning board, and our zoning by-laws which bear the brunt of a good deal of criticism. We need the simplest possible by-laws to solve our major problems. For the benefit of all members of council, I would like to touch briefly on our relations with the press."

"Most press reports are accurate accounts of actual happenings, or statements. If we are unhappy about the printed account of a meeting or statement, we might do well to take a good look at ourselves. The reported image of your words and actions might very well be a true reflection of your behavior in council. It is not my intention to discourage members from speaking out. This you must do — it is your duty to the people who elected you. But in mind, your words will be held to your credit or otherwise. The press is the surest form of liaison between the electors and their chosen representatives."

Mayor Asks Support for Library Suggests its Financing by Taxes

In his inaugural address, Mayor Les Duby spoke first of the rights and responsibilities of councillors and the necessity of continuity of efforts. He foresaw a busy first three months with the finance committee striking a mill rate by early April.

Two years ago, I proposed that the No. 2 Committee of council, and Parks Board, should meet together once or twice and consider some extension of usable park area. We were not able to accomplish anything in this respect, due to the unforeseen workload in other areas. However, with much of our roadwork now behind us, perhaps we can tackle this matter once again.

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Ella, McCaig, Alexander Jerseys Award Winners

Three Jersey cow winners, Ella Star, McCaig and Alexander, were announced for Jersey cows in three district herds.

A lifetime production certificate has been issued to Rock Ella Star, rated Excellent, in herd of Ken Ella and Sons, Hornby, who in eight lactations produced 78,195 lbs. of milk and 4,500 lbs. of fat. Ella Star is also a winner of two silver medals, one gold medal and a Ton of Gold certificate.

Farm Record Book Available

Keeping farm records is becoming more of a necessity as today's farm businesses get larger and more complex. Therefore, the Ontario Department of Agriculture has recently released an updated version of Publication 540, Ontario Farm Record Book.

New sections have been added. For example, pages for swine receipts, beef receipts, and enterprise comparisons. Other sections have been revised in keeping with modern farming trends. Depreciation is now calculated on the straight-line basis, so total fixed costs per enterprise can now be worked out. This book is especially adapted for Income Tax purposes.

This new edition is available free from the Ontario Department of Agriculture, Milton. A special ordering is being held at the Agricultural Office, on Thursday, January 6, to instruct people in the use of this book.
