On Authority

Reeve Cameron Lush was appointed by Council as the township representative on the Grand Valley Authority for 1966. Several lots in the village of Rockwood were recommended for conveyance approval to the Minister of Municipal Affairs.

The Council instructed the assessor to collect the outstanding dog licenses by whatever means shall be deemed necessary. A by-law appointing a Road Superintendent and fixing his remuneration (subject to the approval of the Department of Highways) was given first and second readings. Remuneration to be salary of \$5,500 annually.

Rockwood Curbing

The council respectfully requested the Road Committee and Engineer of Wellington County to make every effort to have the curb and gutter system on Road 69, in the Village of Rockwood, continued from the C.N.R. tracks to the northern limits of the Village.

The Reeve, Deputy Reeve and Councillor Milne as well as the Road Superintendent are to be a committee to interview the County Road Committee regarding curb and gutters in the Village of Rockwood, and the Reeve, road superintendent and clerk are to make application to the Department of Highways for the remainder of the 1965 road subsidy.

The Road Superintendent was instructed to reserve a room at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, for the Ontario Good Roads convention in February, and his expenses be charged to the road account. He was also instructed to have the pick-up truck body repaired and painted by Graham Auto Body, Rockwood at a price of \$160.

At Crewsons Corners

It was moved that the Road Superintendent be instructed to improve the approaches to the C.N.R. track crossing at Crewsons Corners, as soon as time and weather permit, and the cost be borne equally between the Townships of Nassagaweya and Eramosa.

Accounts amounting to \$13,858.30 (General \$491.50; road accounts \$13,366.80) were passed for payment and the meeting adjourned to meet at 1 p.m. on Monday, February 7, 1966 or at the call of the Reeve.
