

Pounding the SPORTS BEAT

Fergus Flyers, smarting from two defeats the past week and lingering at the bottom of the five team W.O.A.A. Int. B. circuit, have induced Bob Dobbie to re-join the team. Dobbie was out with the club Sunday for practice and he'll probably fit into the lineup as soon as he's fit to play.

Flyers also hope to entice Paul Knox back into the lineup. Knox has been playing industrial hockey all season, and it's thought with Dobbie back in there Knox will soon follow. Big John McCabe has already rejoined the lineup after spending the first half of the schedule coaching.

The acquisition of these players should give Fergus a new lease and might just land them in a playoff spot. They're only one point behind Orangeville at this writing and have a game in hand.

Flyers nearly upset Hespeler last Thursday night in the mill town. They led 3-1 up until the last five minutes when the bubble burst and Macs rattled three goals in.

At the same time as the Tanners were bombing Fergus Friday, Durham and Hespeler were engaged in an overtime battle in the northern town. Huskies won 4-3.

The loss kept Hespeler from outrunning the Tanners and Huskies since the Acton team won and stayed tied for first with Hespeler.

Meanwhile, back at the ranch, the Tanners are pepping for a visit from Orangeville Friday and a trip to Hespeler tonight (Thursday). Coach Junior Beaumont has the team working a lot better than they showed in their last appearance here against Durham.

They're moving the puck better and shooting something lacking when they last played here. The Tanners have scored 23 goals in their last two outings while allowing six against.

Part of the reason for the increased output has been the improvement in shooting from some of the veterans who had been hitting goal posts, or firing an inch or two wide. Now they seem to be hitting the target.

Tanners Bomb Fergus Flyers 11-4

Veteran Harold Townsley potted four goals, three of them in the last period, as Acton Tanners bombed the shorthanded Fergus Flyers 11-4 in W.O.A.A. Int. B. hockey Friday night in Fergus.

The win—Acton's eighth against three losses—and a tie elevated the Tanners back into a first place deadlock with Hespeler who took over the top spot temporarily with a 6-5 win over Fergus Thursday.

It looked like the Tanners would run Flyers into the ice with their strong attack in the first few minutes of the opening chapter. But Flyers came back from a 4-1 deficit at the end of the first to threaten the lead in the second stanza while the Tanners seemed to wilt.

Lack Horses

Fergus almost pulled an upset the previous night against Hespeler and they tried hard again Friday but they didn't have the horses to stay with the Tanners, even with big John McCabe back on defense.

Largidon, in goal for an ailing Don Prickett, turned in a top performance robbing Don McKenzie of at least two goals. Sweeney didn't have much to do for the Tanners but he had no chance on the pucks which eluded him, two of them fired by Gord Nolan.

Besides Townsley's four goals, the Tanners got a pair from captain Blake Inglis and singles from Jim Farrelly, Tim Haines, Danny Arbie, Emmerson (Beaver) Baxter and Howie Evans.

Don McKenzie couldn't hit the target himself but he collected four assists to be the top helper for the Tanners; Fred Kentner, who assisted Townsley on two of his counters had three brackets, Jim Farrelly got two and Tim Haines, Jim Cunningham, Bob Daniels, Doug Evans and Gary Cooper had one apiece.
