There was an old-fashioned sing-song, followed by vocal selections by Mrs. Robert Kerr and Mr. Archie Kerr, Muriel and Helena Hills and Mr. Peter Binnie, the latter just recently returned from overseas.

Sigmn. Frank Jones returned to Canada on the Mauretania. Gnr. Frank Toth was another Acton soldier on the same ship. He was with the 19th Field Artillery for three and a half years and was two and a half years overseas. He was wounded at Caen last year with shrapnel.

A couple of cases of measles have developed in town. The Board of Health promptly placarded the houses and it is hoped the quarantine will confine this undesirable disease to the two patients.
