

Renovations Highlight Past Year Reports at Annual Meeting Show

An active and progressive year for Knox Presbyterian church was reviewed Wednesday evening last week at the congregational annual meeting in the Sunday School room. Nearly 80 attended.

A total objective of \$28,040 was accepted for 1965 including \$5,000 for the Canadian and world church, \$1,480 for Christian Education here and a sum for repairs to the manse.

Due to the extensive program of renovations and the special funds donated last year's total giving amounted to a record \$38,691.

For the first time a woman was named to the Board of Managers. Mrs. Helen Desjardins, who has acted as "treasurer" of the church for a number of years, is now a board member. Others elected for a three-year term are: Muriel Scoville, Garry Allan, Ronald Giese, Alex Walde and Doug Mason.

Trustees elected were R. R. Parker and Louise Poirier. Trustees are James Angus, Herb Ritchie and Keith Lewis.

The acceptance of the proposed renovation program by the congregation set the stage for an interior facelift both upstairs and downstairs. Present to review Scoville chairman of the Board of Managers, The Mary Ellen Anderson room, vastly improved as now, an all-purpose room.

The biggest part of the project was the basement renovations including the deepening of the floor, new footings, concrete

floor, new kitchen, two new wash rooms, and new heating system, new lighting and tile in transept and paneling. The response to the financial appeal was "most gratifying". It appears the indebtedness occasioned by the renovations will be wiped out by June 1967, the report stated.

Three Groups Aid

The Board of Managers extend thanks to the three organizations which assisted the Ladies' Aid: assumed \$4,000 of the cost of the kitchen; the Heather Club gave \$400 for fixtures and value of the second floor wash room. Daughters of Knox are underwriting the cost of a kitchenette adjacent to the Mary Ellen Anderson room.

The session reported its members had "taken pleasure in naming the upper multi-purpose room behind the gallery in memory of Miss Mary Ellen Anderson, who went forth from this church to labor for Christ overseas, and whose memory we are anxious to perpetuate. The basement auditorium has also been renamed and will henceforth be known as The Dr. A. C. Stewart Memorial Hall. It is named in honor of the great minister and servant of God who led this congregation in the years from 1921 till 1930."

Looking into the future, Mr. McKenzie mentioned several possible projects: insulation of the choir room, insulation of transept, asphalt shingles on the bell tower, an adequate sign, tiling of the basement floor, painting of the choir room, vestry and Sunday school room; cabinets for the junior congregation and nursery.
