### Will Soon Announce Dates of TB Clinics

Dr. A. F. Bull, M.O.H. and Medical Advisor to the current Mass. Tuberculin Testing and X-ray Survey in Halton County has issued a statement explaining the use of the tuberculin test and miniature films in the survey.

"Persons who receive a tuberculin test, are asked to return to the clinic on a specific day to determine if there has been a reaction to the test," Dr. Bull said.

"All persons over 40 years of age, are then asked to have an X-ray. Diagnosis of tuberculosis is seldom made on the basis of the miniature film taken at the mobile X-ray units," he added.
