Protective Assoc. Will Keep Going

Devoted to the interests of Halton County farmers for more than 60 years, the Halton County Protective Association held its annual meeting in Milton recently and members voted unanimously to keep the Association in operation for at least another year.

The Association is believed to have been formed around the turn of the century for the mutual protection of all members.

Just One Claim

For the past few years the Association has been operating more like an insurance agency and if any animals belonging to members are stolen or disappear, the Association attempts to make some compensation to the member. The secretary-treasurer explained there are about 25 members now and about 13 attended the annual meeting. This year one claim was paid out to Andy Shea for \$70.

While noting the Association isn't nearly as active as it used to be, Mr. Peacock said the major reason was because of the "excellent police protection in the County". He noted that on the average for the past 10 years, there have been about one claim every two years. The Association has quite a large bank balance so it would take a "fair sized disaster" to make it financially poor, he indicated.

Name Ross Segsworth Chairman, Halton County Milk Committees

Fifteen men were elected to represent the more than 310 milk producers in Halton County, when the Halton County Milk Committee was founded on Thursday afternoon.

More than 180 milk producers from all parts of the county gathered in the Masonic Hall, Milton, and selected an executive of 15 men to represent the interests of all fluid milk shippers, concentrated milk shippers and cheese milk producers in the county.

The newly formed Halton County Milk Committee is only one of nearly 30 county committees in the province that has been organized in recent weeks. The county committees will have direct contact with the recently organized Ontario Milk Marketing Board which plans to start buying milk in Ontario by August or September.

The following milk producers won out in the battle of 23 milk producers for 15 slots on the committee: John Bird, Esquesing; George Pelletier, Burlington; Kyle Bingham, Esquesing; Mac Alexander, Esquesing; Russel Hurren, Nassagaweya; Ross Segsworth, Burlington; Jim Reid, Esquesing; Craig Reid, Burlington; Ross Lawrence, Oakville; Fred Nurse, Esquesing; Bruce McLure, Esquesing; Victor Lawrence, Oakville; Sam Harrop, Esquesing; Bruce Bawden, Burlington; and Colin Marshall, Oakville.

At a director's meeting immediately following the two and one-half hour business meeting, Ross Segsworth was elected chairman of the committee and George Pelletier was named vice-chairman. Victor Lawrence was selected as secretary. Bruce McLure was named as the committee's representative to the Halton County Federation of Agriculture and Russell Hurren was named as the committee's representative on the

Halton Farm Safety Council

The Ontario Department of Agriculture's representative in Halton County Henry Stanley, was chairman for the meeting. After a brief discussion it was unanimously agreed to the formation of the committee and, then a discussion took place as to whether or not the members should be elected on an "at large basis", or whether they should represent the four rural areas in the county. It was finally decided by a narrow margin of five votes, to have the members elected "at large".

Maurice Beatty of R.R. 1 Milton, a member of the Ontario Milk Marketing Board, and Laverne Dymont, also a member of the Ontario Board, attended the meeting and answered the queries of the milk producers.

W. E. Breckon of Burlington, a former director of the Toronto Milk Producers, spoke to the group and out-lined conditions in the milk business when he first became active in the 1920's. He told the group, "the Ontario Board has a wonderful job to do and I wish them the very best of luck."

According to statistics revealed by Mr. Stanley there are approximately 310 milk producers in Halton who ship to 18 different outlets. More than a third of the producers—130, are from Esquesing, while 96 are from Oakville, 50 are from Burlington and 34 are from Nassagaweya.
