A \$1,000,000 expansion program which would boost the grandstand capacity at Mohawk Raceway to over 40,000 and boost the capacity of the terrace dining lounge by 50 per cent could be completed by the fall.

If expansion plans are carried out, tenders for structural steel would be called for within the next-few weeks and work would probably begin on the project immediately following the end of the spring meeting in May.

The present grandstand capacity would be doubled and the popular dining lounge would be increased in size by 50 per cent. making it suitable for about 540 rather than the present 300.
