This Committee will examine and evaluate the present program, receive representations from all interested bodies about the effectiveness, and desirability of the program, consider suggestions for changes and improvement, study means by which character building, ethics, social attitudes and moral values and principles may best be instilled in the young, consider the responsibility of the Public Schools in these matters, and make recommendations for the information and consideration of the Minister.
