Purchase New Site For Rockwood School

Eramosa Township School Board has purchased a new site for Rockwood public school. Approximately 6 acres, have been purchased from Birton Hill (Edgar Harris property) bordered by Fall Street, Mary Street, and Pastore Street in the village of Rockwood. This site is ideally located with a grove of trees bordering two sides of the property.

The school board has decided to build a 12-room school plus multi-purpose room. The multi-purpose room will be 50 ft. by 60 ft. plus an 18 ft. stage.

Discussions have been held with the Eramosa Recreation Committee in regard to gym requirements. Some of the auxiliary rooms will be teacher and board rooms, change rooms, storage rooms for caretaker and school supplies, principal's office and secretary's office.

Not Enough Space The present school site has been abandoned for future expansion on account of inadequate land area. This site was purchased in 1873, four lots from Henry Strange at a price of \$150 and six lots from Rev. E. M. Stewart of Ireland at a price of \$300 - the total area being two acres.

The original school was a one storey structure until 1930 when the school was raised to provide two stories and six classrooms. Both the public school and Continuation School were accommodated here until 1946 when the secondary pupils were transported to Guelph.

New washrooms were added in 1955 and two additional classrooms in 1958 making it an eight room school. No expansion in property size has ever been made since it was originally purchased in 1873.

Present members of the Eramosa School Board are - chairman Murray Smeltzer, vice-chairman Dr. R. J. Hilton, trustees Ross McDougall, Douglas Buttenham and Lloyd Waddell.
