Dr. Harley Named to Veterans' Committee.

Halton's federal M.P. Dr. Harry Harley of Oakville got another job in the federal government despite a procedural battle in the House over the method of naming him.

He was selected as vice-chairman of the Commons' standing committee on veterans affairs, a post he held prior to the November election. Dr. Harley has also been named chairman of the health and welfare committee and was reappointed to the special food and drug committee which has been studying the cost of drugs in Canada. He was chairman of this food and drug committee last year.

Dr. Harley's first task is to start the health and welfare committee on a study into abortion and birth control laws — the first inquiry of its kind on record in the parliament. The M.P. earlier, before the Commons, urged reforms in both divorce and birth control laws and called the law on contraceptives "foolish".
