

# LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

## TRICOUNTY TOURNAMENT

Many local duplicate bridge players attended the Tri-County Bridge Tournament in Guelph. The local bridge club was well represented at the sectional tournament held in Guelph last weekend. This is the fourth year for the Tri-County Tournament which operates under a sanction from the American Contract Bridge League. Attendance records were shattered in all events.

I cannot give the actual ranks obtained by all the players, but I will indicate in some cases when they were above average. Above average in duplicate bridge means that a pair was better than at least one half the total number of players.

Friday night was the mixed pairs with 27 tables (54 pairs) in competition. Duke Wilson and Miss Marjory Mackenzie of Georgetown had an above average game, while your columnist and his wife didn't fare as well. Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Barbour also played in the mixed pairs and were just on the average score. Bob Remington of Acton partnered with Mrs. Mary Manning of Eden Mills, and Mrs. R. Dickson playing with Mrs. Smith, both of Erin, were above average in a nine-table non passing pairs game the same night.

Saturday was the open pairs and local players showed very well. This event is run in two sessions. A qualifying round was in the afternoon, with the final round in the evening. A total of 109 pairs entered this game.

Lou Bertasson and Harry Frost of Milton came first in their section in the afternoon, but were out of the money in the evening. Your columnist, playing with his father Jack Coats, was second in their section in the afternoon and held on, to come out eighth overall in the evening. Mike Lorusso and Lloyd Keir of Georgetown were fourth their way in the afternoon game. Bob Remington and Duke Wilson also tried the open pairs but did not qualify.

In the evening, there was a consolation game. Mrs. Gloria Coats played with Mrs. Mary Manning in one section, while Miss Marjory Mackenzie and Miss Olive Logan, also of Georgetown, put together an above average game in another consolation section.

In the team game on Sunday, this area, was represented by a team whose members were Bob Remington, Duke Wilson, Mike Lorusso and Jim Kahl. I do not have the results of Sunday's game as I write this column.

Often, good results are obtained on hands played at a low level. Here is one from the open pairs game, in which my father and I got the second best result in a hand played 26 different times. We were defending and I sat East.

North's double is called a take-out double and it requests partner to bid his best suit. My redouble shows at least 10 points. South bid his best suit, which unfortunately for him was also my best suit.

I guess that North was afraid to switch into one of his minor suits in case he ran into trouble there as well. West got off to the excellent lead of spade five. Three rounds of trump led declarer in poor shape. He tried to ruff a club on which East discarded a diamond, so he didn't even make two diamond tricks. In all, he took only five tricks—two spades, two clubs and one diamond. I wonder what result could have been better than that since East-West cannot even make game on their cards.

# New Maple Leaf Flags For Each R.L. Classroom

Rev. Ritchie McMurray gave a talk on the importance of having a flag and outlined the meaning of one. Each country has a flag of its own with the same purpose. He told the pupils that three words told what the flag means. The first word is Sign, which means a country has a unique flag which is recognized as that of the particular country it stands for. The second word was Unity, which means a flag is a sign of unity in a country. The third was Noble which means a flag is a sign of everything good in each country.

The first letter in each word spells out SUN, and the flag is like the sun which shines over a country. In conclusion Rev. McMurray gave a prayer of dedication.

Also taking part in the program were Robert Lovell who gave a Bible reading, Elaine Johnson who read a Bible story and Peter Marzo who led the audience in prayer. Kindergarten teacher Mary

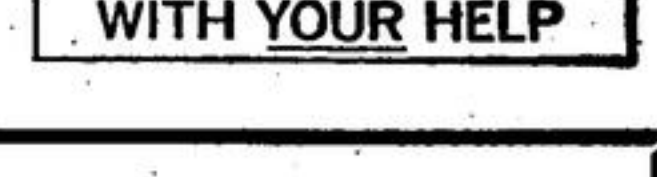
