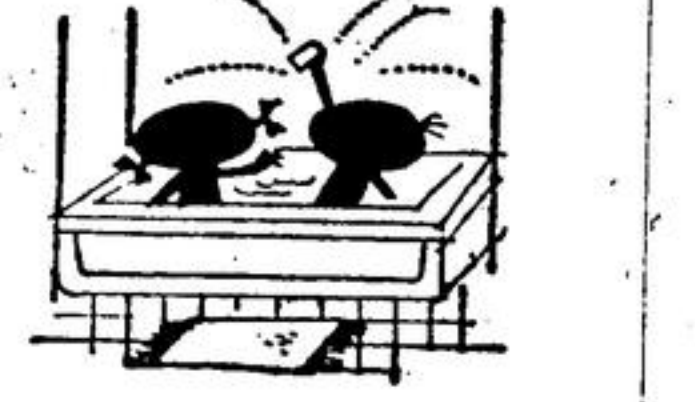

**Report From Queen's Park**

The Honourable William Davis, the Minister of Education, has announced the 18 areas in the province where Colleges of Applied Art and Technology will be established. For the most part, each area is made up of two or three counties including towns and townships in parts of counties.

There will be a college for the Halton-Peel area and, naturally, I hope it will be within our boundaries. Mr. Davis is also a member for Peel and I have suggested to him that he wouldn't dare put it there!

These colleges, sometimes known as Community Colleges, will provide a two year course after grade 12. A student up to 19 years of age may apply. The emphasis will be on trades, technical and vocational courses although some academic subjects will be taught. There will be both day and evening courses and a student may obtain a certificate or diploma after completion of two years. Residence or dormitory facilities will not be provided except possibly in some areas of northern Ontario.

These schools will help meet the needs of graduates of our secondary schools who do not wish to go to university. They will also provide courses that are not available in our high schools such as

apprenticeship training, engineering technicians, agriculture and certain commercial and trade courses.

Students who wish to go to university after the two year course may do so. Such students, for the most part, would be eligible to enter second year university.

The evening course will help train and re-train adults and out-of-school youth so that they may meet the ever increasing demands of a highly skilled work force.

These Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology will allow much more freedom of choice of subjects and courses than is allowed in our high schools and universities.

The idea is to help a man or a woman obtain education and training in a niche where his or her talents and ability can best be nurtured and developed, and above all to provide an interest in learning. In this way our young people will be in a position to take advantage of the many opportunities of employment in Ontario.
