Commission Expo Sculpture From Artist Yosef Drenters

Rockwood — Yosef Drenters, local sculptor and owner of the historic Rockwood Academy, has been commissioned by the Ontario Department of Economics and Development to make a sculpture for the \$8,000,000 Ontario Pavilion at Expo 67 in Montreal.

Yosef's "Pioneer Family" was one of six models submitted. The jury of artists also chose "Walking Women" by Michael Snow of Toronto, done in stainless steel. Each will receive a \$25,000 award.

The Drenters display will be of beaten metal and wood and stands 35 feet high under a fluted Victorian roof. Eighteen foot long timbers, hand hewn by Canadian pioneers, will support the roof.

On cross beams will be a father holding a plow, the mother at her spinning wheel, a son holding a wheeled horse and the daughter nursing her doll. The sculpture will be taken to Montreal by March 1, 1967, and set up in the Ontario Pavilion outer court.

"I want to portray the ability of the pioneer age to blend into a twentieth century setting," said Yosef. "I try to make my art show Canada in its natural beauty, which impressed me when I arrived in 1951. I came with the idea of giving something to my new country."

Yosef was born in Belgium of Dutch parentage, and after coming to Canada worked in British

Columbia on a ranch, and in a Yukon mine. He became a Canadian citizen in 1957 shortly after his family moved to their home on 24 Highway north of Rockwood.

Bought Academy Yosef later purchased the Rockwood Academy where he does his work and has received world-wide recognition.

The small model "Pioneer Family" will soon be on display in the Toronto Art Gallery and at the conclusion of the Fair the large sculpture will be placed in Toronto for public exhibition.

Congratulations to Yosef for this great honor he so well deserves!
