During his address, the Bishop explained the items of his apparel which mark him as a Bishop — the ring, the pectoral cross and the staff, and he gave them to three of the candidates to hold.

The anamyst in his ring bears the seal of the diocese; the gold part of the ring was designed by

himself and bears the emblems of his former diocese in Ireland and the parish which presented him with it, St. George's in St. Catharines. He gave the ring to Leticia Pratt of hold.

The pectoral cross, which hangs around his neck, was given to Gordon Morris to hold. It is the symbol of the Christian faith and of his personal vocation.

The staff is the shepherd's crook, the symbol of the Bishop's pastoral concern for every individual member of the diocese. Randy Coker held the staff.

The Bishop later presented Confirmation Cards to each candidate. These were signed by the rector after their first Communion, which for most of them was on Easter Sunday.

Mr. McMurray presented the boys and girls with bookmarks, the ladies with small crosses and the men with copies of Archbishop Ramsey's book "On the Resurrection of Our Lord".

The Bishop was accompanied to Acton by the Rev. Desmond Flemming who, since arriving in Canada from Ireland 48 hours before, had attended three services. He has just joined the diocese.

Once a week throughout the fall and winter the candidates took instruction.
