"First" for Arena Shipment to Britain

Rockwood International Ltd., R.R. 1, Georgetown, had a hand in an unusual "first" last week.

The company's Esquimes arena was the shipping point for a herd of six Guernsey cattle purchased by English buyers from leading breeders in the area.

The shipment of Guernseys from North America to the British Isles where they originated constitutes a world first.

A Rockwood International official said that the North American Guernseys are larger than those in the UK and this factor led to the unusual situation.

Both Guernsey and Jersey strains originated in the Channel Islands. The Six Guernseys will be trucked to Montreal, loaded aboard ship there, and eventually transported to farms at Newbury and Cheshire.
