industry and send it all to us."
Reeve Hinton reported that
planners were tending to disre-
gard ratios. He suggested peo-
ple were over-impressed by com-
mercial-residential assessment ra-
tios. The mayor felt more concern
about the movement of the tax
rate over the years.

Glenlea Playground
Rotary president, Mac Sprout
asked whether any plans were be-
ing considered to improve the
park facilities in Glenlea and
Lakeview areas, since children in
these areas had no place to play
except in the streets. Vic Bristow
reviewed the situation in Lake-
view and access to a small park
area there.

The Clerk reported \$500 had
been budgeted for improvement in
the Glenlea park and G. W.
McKenzie of the Y's Men said
money for playground equipment
was in the bank waiting until the
park was useable. It was reported
that the \$500 in the budget would
pay for site improvements this
year.

Quarry Blasts
Discussion on the effects of
blasting at the quarry on homes
in Acton brought the suggestion
from Reeve Hinton that any prob-
lems were not necessarily those
of the county but of the local
municipalities concerned, in this
case Esquimaux and Acton in con-
junction with the province. He
reported Acton Council has in-
vestigated the blasting at the
quarry. It was pointed out by the
quarry, the blasts are well below
the maximum limits of the provin-
cial and federal departments
and met all standards.

Chairman Ray Arbie said that
in the investigation during his
time on Council the blasting has
considered a model set-up and
could not be improved. "They
have a lot of arguments" and con-
clusive information." Clerk Mc-
Geachie reported the quarry had
on file a record of every blast
since the start of operation, which
made it pretty hard to fight. How-
ever, he also said the quarry has
agreed to have their engineers
study every serious and legitimate
complaint to determine if the
quarry is in any way involved.

panel and the Y's Men's Club
for taking part in, and sponsoring
the civic night dinner. Other
