Meeting Topic**

Rockwood — Miss Helen Bayne was program convener for the April meeting of Unit 2 of the Rockwood United Church Women. Miss Bayne led in an Easter worship service called "A Lively Hope", based on Scriptures.

The texts brought the thought that because of the resurrection of our Lord, there is hope for us all. The Scripture lesson was followed by an Easter hymn, with prayer by Miss Bayne. The Litany of Praise was read in unison.

Discuss Wheat Shipment

An informative skit "Wheat Goes Abroad" was presented by Miss H. Bayne, Mrs. C. Meek and Mrs. S. Harris. The ladies discussed the pros and cons of wheat going to China. Every year there is an increase of population over production and they must import wheat. This is necessitated by natural disasters, shortage of machinery and the industrialization of agricultural areas.

In northern China, they use wheat for dumplings and noodles. The people are very dependent on grains for certain of their vitamins, since they get very little protein.

Canada also ships wheat to India under the Food and Agricultural Organization agency of the United Nations.

Work with UNICEF

Our country works closely with UNICEF and the World Health Organization. Many parts of India are accustomed to using rice only, which is deficient in protein. Indian nutritionists must train parents to improve their diets by using the wheat we send to them. An interesting discussion followed the presentation of the skit.

Miss Bayne thanked all who had taken part in the program and Miss Hamilton for the use of her home. A contest was held and lunch was served during a social half hour.

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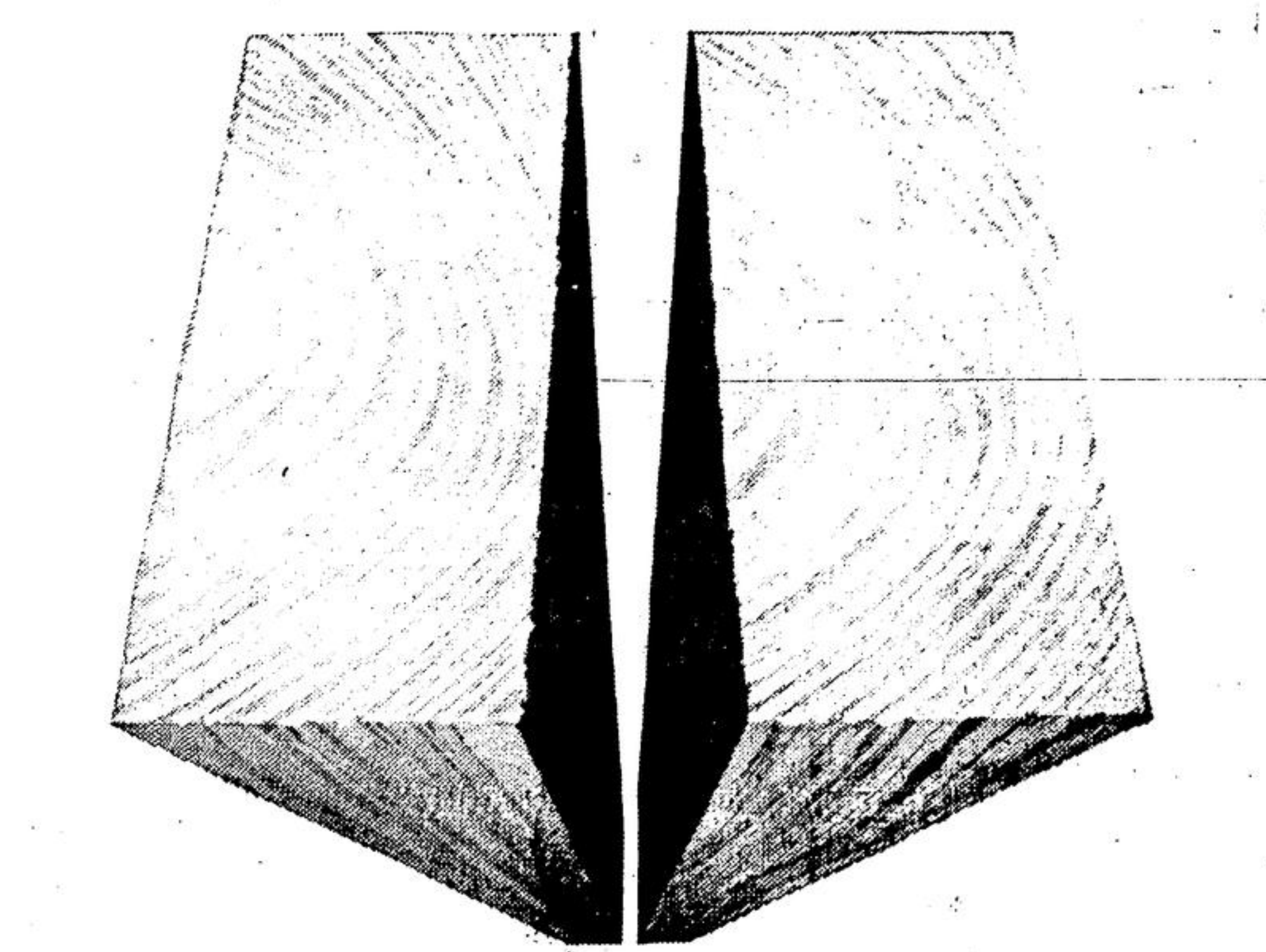
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
