An Innovation**Meat-Cutting Demonstration At IGA Store for 4-H Clubbers**

An innovation was introduced into the 4-H program on April 20, when members of the Acton 4-H Cal Club were hosted at a meat-cutting demonstration, as part of their first meeting. The event was sponsored by the management of the local IGA. Grocerette in co-operation with officials of Oshawa Wholesale.

The opening part of the meeting was held at the Community Centre. President Walter Tryssenaar presided over the business portion, assisted by secretary Carolyn Spear.

The group which also included parents and leaders moved to the IGA store where the stage was set for the demonstration, complete with seating accommodation and a large cutting block in front of the meat counter.

Appreciate Qualities

Before introducing the host, club leader Nino Braida reminded the members that meat which forms a major part of the human diet, is the end product of the beef-raising industry. He told the gathering that the purpose of such a demonstration was to make them appreciate the superior quality of a "Red Brand" carcass and help them to evaluate the live beef animal on its dress-out potential during their judging sessions.
