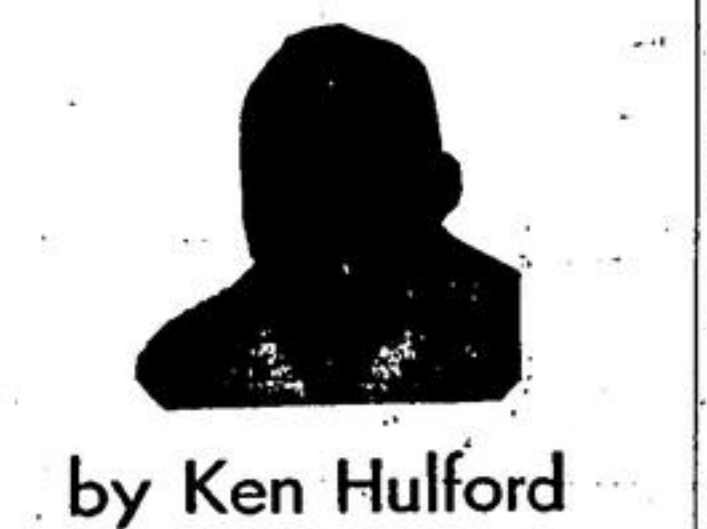
Industrial-Commercial

Nassagaweya Council Briefs

At a special meeting on Monday evening, Nassagaweya Township councillors:

- Received a delegation from the Halton County Museum Bd. to discuss the turning over of the Richmond School to the Museum Board. Solicitor A. J. Nicholls read a proposed lease covering a 99 year period and setting the annual rent fee at \$1. The only item which drew any real opposition was the suggestion in the lease that the building could be used for a "tea room". Councillor Mrs. Anne MacArthur queried "what is this tea room bit?" After some discussion, council agreed to a suggestion to have the proposed lease changed to say that no con-

cessions would be allowed. Both council and the Museum Board will study the lease, and it was hoped final approval could be obtained in the near future.

- Approved the Halton Region Conservation Authority's plan for financing the Hilton Falls Reservoir, to be built within the township. Authority members Dr. C. A. Martin and Allan Masson attended the meeting to explain the financing plan which covers a 13 year period. The initial cost to the township for one year will be \$142 and after that, it will be \$150 each year.
- Heard Councillor MacArthur tell Conservation Authority members Masson and Martin that if land in the township continues to be taken over by the Authority, then the taxpayers of the township should receive

some compensation in some way because of the loss in assessment.

- Heard Reeve William Coulter express concern that representatives of the Acton and Milton District High School Boards have not yet contacted the council regarding high school education levies for 1966.
- Heard a suggestion from Deputy Reeve William Hoey and Councillor Mrs. Anne MacArthur that ratepayers should be happy with the progress being made concerning the quarry problems in the Township. A council committee has a meeting with a representative from the Department of Mines at which several proposals were made. They included:
 - The Department of Mines should be informed of violations by quarry and gravel pit operators which might come under the Department's jurisdiction.
 - The idea of keeping seismograph recordings of all major blasts would be a fair move, the Department representative J. M. Hughes said.



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
