### "Freak" Crash Claims Life

A Cooksville motorist who died following a "freak" accident on Highway 401 near Milton Thursday was the third man killed on the highway in this district in the past two months.

William Nixon, age 40, of 1054 Flagship Dr., Cooksville, died early Friday afternoon at Milton District Hospital of injuries received in the 9:30 a.m. accident. His westbound car, travelling along Highway 401 just east of the CNR overpass, a mile east of Highway 25, was struck by a run-away car trailer.

The small flat trailer, empty at the time, was being towed by a truck in the eastbound lanes when the trailer broke loose, crossed the median and struck the side of Mr. Nixon's car. The truck was driven by Charles Roscoe Robb of London.

A passenger in the Nixon car escaped uninjured. Damage totalled \$2,500. Const. H. Collison of Milton O.P.P. reported.

The club members sang "Ten Years Ago" and "I'll Be Home for Christmas" and thanked the members for the pleasant surprise.

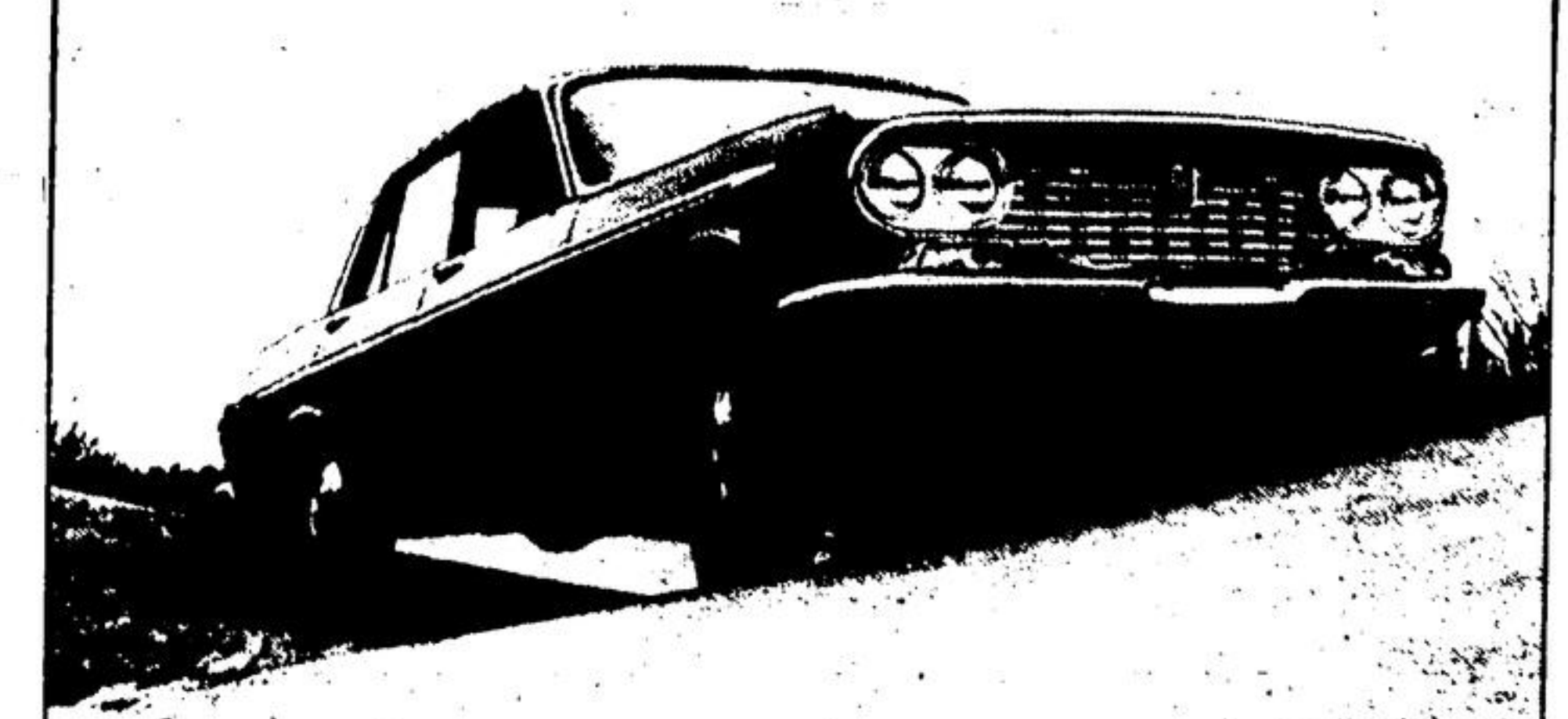
During the luncheon session it was noted that Acton club joins with the Provincial Organization of Senior Citizens.

### THE TOYOTA CROWN COULD BE CALLED A COMPACT BUT IT'S TOO WELL BUILT!



Back in the days when the term "compact" was coined, it was decided that a compact should have maximum dimensions for wheelbase, overall length, engine power and weight.

The wheelbase, overall length and power made common sense. But the weight limit meant that all compact cars were flimsy and just didn't stand up under hard use. The compacts fell apart and so did sales and the "compact" grew up and became "intermediate" and juzzed up 41 jobs.

The body is made of 18-gauge steel 14 s.w.g. heavier than standard automotive sheet metal, it is undercoated, has a three stage rust preventive treatment and is heavily painted with acrylic enamels. The entire body is insulated against road and wind noise, heat and cold. Open up a hood at 40 miles an hour and you'll realize just how quiet a Crown is.

In Japan the Toyota Crown is the most luxurious car made so it's loaded with equipment they call accessories or extra cost options on other cars. When you buy a Toyota Crown the only extra available is a radio. Toyota has standard equipment other makers don't even list as options.

If you think Japanese cameras and motor cycles are good, then take a long look at a Toyota Crown and you'll see what Japanese quality really means. And like other Japanese quality products, the Toyota can be sold at a price way below its European competition. You can't really compare the Toyota Crown with domestic compacts. Remember the Crown has been forced out of this class because it's too well built.

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
