Halton, Peel Unite To Sponsor Crusade

The local arrangements committee of Crusade in Evangelism has announced the first limited evangelistic crusade ever held in Halton and Peel supported by 22 churches. Brampton Memorial Arena has been chosen as the place and Evangelist Barry Moore of London, Ontario has been named as the missionary for the eight day crusade scheduled for next September. Interest in the project has been widespread with inquiries from Orangeville to Streetsville and from Acton to Woodbridge. The executive committee is headed by Capt. Carl Bowes of the Brampton Salvation Army Citadel with Rev. Gordon Stevens, Pentecostal, as co-chairman. Secretary is Rev. D. Stringer, United Church, and Dr. Max Eagleston serves as treasurer.

Already the committee has brought in an evangelistic film from the Billy Graham Headquarters called "The Restless Ones." This is a two hour dramatic film in color and sound which is to be shown in the Peel High School auditorium, the second week in May. Admission is by tickets on sale through the churches and local business merchants.

The contact man for Acton is Jim Bailey. "The production of "The Restless Ones" film has given our organization the opportunity to function in advance of the September Crusade," Chairman Bowes said. "Now we can build on this experience to pack the Brampton Arena for the September Crusade."

Evangelist Barry Moore has received national attention ever since his Evangelistic Crusade in Winnipeg climaxed with 12,000 in attendance. His meteoric appearance on the Canadian scene has captured headlines in almost every major newspaper across Canada.

The organization already includes over 50 leading clergymen and laymen throughout this area and hopes to secure the backing of the majority of Christians in the North Peel-Halton area. Water and fireworks displays will be a nightly feature at Expo 67.

HARLEY...to HALTON

The Budget debate has been completed without incident. Later in the session specific recommendations of the Budget will be presented in Bill form and debated in detail by the House of Commons. The last two days have been devoted to various pieces of legislation and at least ten various items have passed.

The Prime Minister has introduced a resolution which will give the Civil Service bargaining rights and in some cases the right to strike. The resolution was discussed briefly, passed, and now will appear in Bill form which is very technical and detailed. In addition a Special Committee of the Senate and House of Commons has been set up to hold public hearings into this matter and to hear representations from interested parties.

One interesting feature took place in the House this week. A member tried to introduce a Private Bill, which would have taken away from the Cabinet the right of commuting death sentences to life imprisonment. The Leader of the Opposition, Mr. Dielenbaker, objected on the grounds that the Bill was unconstitutional, in that it took away a "Royal" prerogative. The Speaker ruled that the member had the right to introduce such a Bill, that no Royal prerogative was at risk until the Bill was in the last stages of being passed. The Leader of the Opposition forced a vote on this issue, which appeared rather strange for a man who strongly supports the rights of Parliament and its members. I certainly do not agree with this Bill and will vote against it if it comes up, but I feel the member was within his right to introduce it.

Two relatively minor Bills concerning the construction of a bridge and a railway line in Ontario passed the House. In addition the following Bills were passed:

New Democrats Meet; Speaker Is University Social Worker

A general membership meeting of the Halton New Democrat Party was held on April 27 at the Galaxy Club in Oakville.

Speaker for the evening was Dr. Farina of the University of Toronto School of Social Work. In addressing the members, Dr. Farina stated that for the first time in human history, man would have an unlimited amount of leisure time—that is, time to pursue his own interests apart from the need to make money.

The place of the government, Dr. Farina stated, was to provide citizens with the widest range of choices for his leisure time activities. The dance, music, art and all creative activities should be looked upon with the same approval as sports activities today.

There existed a lack of co-ordination among provincial departments regarding recreational and leisure time projects. Dr. Farina said—each department carrying out its own policy without knowing of the programs under way in other departments. He charged that one of the best conservation schemes devised in Ontario—that for the Credit River Valley, had been rejected by the Provincial Government because its basic aim had been recreational activities.

Polyethylene Pipe Aids Potash Mining

Flexible polyethylene pipe produced at Micro Plastics division of Building Products of Canada Limited at Acton is making an important contribution to the efficiency of potash mining operations in Saskatchewan.

Carlton pipe is supplied in lengths of 2,150 feet and diameter of 2 1/2". The pipe is being used to pump supercooled brine to freeze quicksand and other soft strata as far as 2,000 feet below the surface, so that mine shafts can be sunk.

The polyethylene pipes carry brine at 45 to 40 degrees Fahrenheit from a ring main pipe at the surface to the bottom of 2,000 foot steel-cased brine wells. The brine then rises between the brine pipes and the steel casing freezing the ground as it goes up.

Up to 40 brine wells are drilled in a circle at intervals of six or seven feet and once the ground is fully frozen the centre of the circle is excavated for the mine shaft.

Building Products has supplied the 2,150-foot pipe lengths on reels 10 feet in diameter, shipped by gondola car. Each reel weighs up to 3,500 lbs. BP extruded the pipe using C-11, C.S.A.—certified minimum density pipe compound.

To overcome acute root penetration at pipe joints, the Township of Etobicoke has installed a PVC polyvinyl Chloride pipe sanitary sewage system in the South Kingsway area.

Root penetration is a serious problem in this section of Metro Toronto. It causes rapid performance deterioration of certain conventional pipes and necessitates costly cleaning operations every six months.


Etobicoke selected Building Products' corrosion-resistant PVC pipe with solvent welded homogeneous joints to replace a system which had deteriorated badly in its 30-year service life.

Norval Building Design Winner

Designers of winning structures in Canada's first wood design awards program for outstanding buildings and bridges were honored at an awards banquet in Ottawa recently.

The Hon. C. M. Drury, Minister of Industry, presented trophies and certificates of design excellence to C. Blackway Millar, designer of the Stephen House, Upper Canada College, Norval and three others. Stephen House—a winning entry in the "schools" category—combines ingenious design with simple materials as expressed in wood trusses, shingles and sheathing. Designed by C. Blackway Millar, Architect, Islington, the general contractor was Gardiner-Wrighton Ltd., Mimico, and fabricator-supplier, Laird-Lumber Company, Weston.
