HOW MUCH does it cost to run an intermediate hockey team for an entire season? A recent executive meeting of Acton Tanners, in which the past season's expenses were reviewed, will help to clear the picture. It will surprise you.

Total expenses for the year amounted to over \$3,700.00 without including all the personal out-of-pocket disbursements members of the executive and some players made for travelling and sundries. Biggest item was \$1,237.00 which went for ice time. Secretarytreasurer George Haggett calculated the Tanners paid \$22.00 an hour

for use of the community centre, including practice times, Next largest expense which took a \$927.00 slice out of the pay packet was equipment. A major portion of that - \$627.00 = went to the stick companies. Sticks seemed to be even more brittle over the past season. Countless hours of repair work trainer Sonny

Townslev put in kept the cost down, Referees, believe it or not, cost the club \$462.00. Some fans would say they aren't worth it but regardless of opinion they are an expense you can't dispense with. There's a 60-40 split between the club and the recreation committee. Referees are paid off the top

before the gate is split. The W.O.A.A. came in for its share of the melon. They got \$341.00 out of club coffers for the usual fees. Medical expenses, including insurance which the club carries, cost \$330.00. The club had more than its share of injuries over the past season, most serious of which was the broken leg Bob Marshall Jr. suffered early in the season at Orangeville.

Travel, according to the ledgers, took only \$90.00, but that figure of course does not include the car expenses thrown in as part of the penalty paid for being associated with a hockey club. There were other items such as advertising, phone calls,



Thirty-four minor teams - five Tyke, six Pee Wee, eight Bantam, seven Midget and eight Juvenile entries will be competing for division crowns.

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
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
