Brigadier Wallace Has Esqueing Farm

Brigadier F. C. Wallace, who was recently appointed chairman of the Ontario Racing Commission, doesn't spend as much time on his 300 acre farm on the 10th Line of Esqueing, north of Georgetown, as he would like.

The 68-year-old veteran of both world wars, a keystone in Canada's glass industry, travels through the week and returns to his farm home near here only on weekends.

When he does manage to get home, Brig. Wallace is likely to take up his favorite pastime — fox hunting. He is a proficient rider and has won countless jump contests.

He owns three thoroughbred horses and keeps the horses of Colonel Allan Burton, of the Robert Simpson Co.

The two men are joint masters of the Eglington Hunt Club. Wallace says there are as many as 75 riders out on a Saturday. The hunt takes them to Orangeville and Brampton areas frequently.

His business positions are many.

He is chairman of Duplate Canada Ltd., a firm making safety glass with plants in Oakville, Oshawa, Windsor, Montreal and St. Therese, Quebec.

He is vice-president of Fiberglass Canada Limited, which also has numerous offices across Canada.

He is chairman of Canadian Pittsburgh Industries, which makes flat glass for building construction. He is also chairman of two Georgetown companies — Smith & Stone and Plax Canada Limited.

Mr. Wallace is a director of Canadian Westinghouse and the government operated Atomic Energy of Canada Limited. He also is associated with many other companies.

Brigadier Wallace was commander of the anti-aircraft forces at Dunkirk in the last war.

A special meeting of Planning Board to include the development committee of council, Mr. Seznack and Mr. Griese had been scheduled for next week.

Commission Pay
Council authorized a by-law to be drawn up establishing payment to Hydro Commissioners at the rate of \$8 per meeting and the chairman at \$10 with a maximum of 24 meetings per year. At the last Hydro meeting, commissioners agreed to the payment. After the by-law is approved by council, Ontario Hydro will be asked for final approval.

Council accepted the auditor's annual financial statement and agreed to have 100 copies printed as well as publication of the report in the Acton Free Press. Councillor Leithland objected.

Switch Posts
Due to the resignation of Hamilton Peal, who was road chairman, council appointed councillor Robert Drinkwater to this capacity, appointed councillor Earl Masales as chairman of the lights and sanitation committee and Mrs. Freese as chairman of the welfare and property committee of council.

By resolution office manager Joe T. Hurst was appointed to the Acton Development Commission and also to act as Acton's representative in the County Development Commission.

It was agreed to support a request from the North Halton Urban Board to appoint at least two members as delegates to Urban Board meetings in future.

Council also:

- Authorized assessor William Erskine to attend the annual assessors' convention at Windsor May 16, 17 and 18 with all expenses paid.
- Authorized payment to the Canadian National Railways amounting to \$6,357.45 for work on the crossing signals during the road widening program. Of this amount the town is expected to receive 90 per cent subsidy.
- Learned the warden's dinner would be held in Acton this year with a tentative date set for October 26 at the Legion auditorium.
- Learned council had been invited to attend a get-together with other Halton Municipal Councils as guests of County Council in Milton, June 15.
