Gentlemen:

We were very surprised to read in your April 28th paper the rates we were quoted as paying in our Action Plant and have to assume that this information was obtained from the Union in an attempt to create a favorable impression in the Action article.

The truth of the situation is that the rates quoted apply in our Hamilton Plant. We have another plant in the Province where the same Union represents the employees there and the female labor rate is \$1.18 per hour. The highest male rate, which is for set up and maintenance, is \$2.18 per hour.

The correct Action wage schedule is attached for your information and I hope that you will publish this to correct any incorrect impressions in the April 28th article.
