SUNDAY AFTERNOON at 1.30 the town softball league leaves the starting gate for a 30 game schedule which winds up on Sunday, August 7.

The league has shrunk from last year's six entries to four, including a brand new club called Herb's Delivery which might possibly bear a close resemblance to the Firefighter teams of past seasons. Firefighters, Dominion Hotel and Georgetown Domtar are the squads which called it quits after last season with the Domtar team opting out in order to form an Intercounty entry

out of Georgetown, Firefighters evidently figured they had enough to do without sponsoring a ball team this season. Lack of interest and players played a part in Dominion Hotel's withdrawal,

That leaves last year's champion Ledger's IGA, Station Hotel, Legion and Herb's Delivery to fight it out for league honorswith Herb Dodds bankrolling the new team.

Reduction from six to four entries may not seem like a good omen for the league but it should certainly improve the calibre of the softball. There has been some opinion in other seasons that in six and even five teams the league was overextending itself. Critics said there weren't enough good players around to keep five clubs staffed.

The answer of course was that the league wasn't really interested in quality but in giving everyone who wanted to; a chance to play. This year's performance, with only four teams involved, will give observers a chance to compare notes with previous seasons. Most fans will agree, I think, that the calibre of play last season did not match its two predecessors, but it was partly due to the weather, often more conducive for football than

League president Harold Townsley says cutting the league to four teams created a playoff problem. It was customary to award playoff spots to the first four clubs with two being knocked off. This season all four teams will make the playoffs but the executive has introduced a new wrinkle in the form of prize money for the top three to make it more competitive.

First place finisher will receive \$30, the second place team will get \$20 and the third place club \$10. Last place will not benefit but they'll have a chance to win the championship pot of \$40. Playoffs will involve the first and third and second and fourth place finishers in a two out of three semi-final. The final series will be a three out of five.

Chester Anderson has been appointed umpire in chief and the league hopes to arrange a suitable array of arbiters from player personnel. An effort is also being made to have a league statistician. He'll probably be named this week.

There has been the usual pre-season scramble for players with pitchers being the most sought-after. The only way you'll be able to gauge the strength of each club is to be in the bleachers when the league opens Sunday. Only admission charge will be the usual silver collection.

THE BIRTHPLACE OF HOCKEY, subject of a long-standing, often acrimonious dispute which has involved Montreal, Kingston and Halifax has been settled according to the Halifax Mail-Star, The Nova Scotia Journal of Education published an article on the subject last year by Dr. Bruce Fergusson, provincial archivist, which concluded "well documented research serves to corroborate Menke's opinion that hockey originated at Halifax and confirms the place of J. G. A. Creighton, C.M.G., K.C., in its development in Montreal."

Dr. Fergusson, member of a prominent Cape Breton family which excels in athletics as well as scholarship, claims Kingston merely imported the rules of "true" ice hockey from Halifax for a game there March 3, 1875. The Novascotian of Feb. 24, 1831, an east coast journal, says Dr. Fergusson, makes reference to games of wicket (hockey) being played at the head of the North West-Arm (in Halifax)

Frank Menke, an American sports historian wrote in the 1940's that in his opinion hockey originated in Halifax, developedinto the modern game in Montreal and was played a short time later in Kingston. Menke says J. G. A. Creighton, a student at McGill University in Montreal, first suggested the college obtain hockey sticks from Halifax and take up the game.

Creighton evidently was born in Halifax and played wicket (hockey) there, the author surmises. Graduating from Dalhousie University in 1868 he furthered his education at McGill in 1877. Through his familiarity with and interest in hockey, Creighton is credited with introducing the game to Montreal.

As far as Nova Scotians are concerned the argument is settled but it's likely Fergusson's thesis will only add more fuel to the controversy. As a matter of fact maybe Acton should put in a claim. Old-timers this fuzzy-cheeked one has spoken to remember when half the village of Acton West used to take part in "shinny" matches on Fairy Lake. Acton's Early Days speaks of it. Back when great grandpappy wore a handlebar moustache and stood at the bar for his brew, the villages hereabouts were playing "shinny" and perhaps the honor of being hockey's birthplace rightfully belongs to some little hamlet long-since disappeared.
