A further meeting will convene to discuss the possibility of the formation of a Council of Women in Acton. At the initial meeting in the Y Monday, representatives talked over the lack of co-ordination in assist-

ance and what could be done. Represented were the Y's Menettes, I.O.D.E., Legion Ladies, Mentally Retarded Association, several churches and the social welfare committee of council. Other groups had also indicated interest but representatives were unable to be pres-

Stated purpose of the meeting was "to see if it would be possible to co-ordinate the social welfare activities of the women's groups of Acton." An introductory sheet of information urged "Make Acton a caring town — one people want to

It was agreed the groups contacted would be asked to name a representative to attend a further meeting in June. An executive may be set up then.

Groups which have their own welfare projects would in all likelihood retain them. Anonymity in cases of financial need would be scrupulously maintained by a Council.

It was agreed the services, many now provided by separate groups or individuals in a haphazard way, would be given by a possible Council of Women only following the request of a welfare officer, public health officer, nurse or minister, or to a service club.

Acton lacks service from the Red Cross, Victorian Order of Nurses and Visiting Homemakers, which are available in larg-

While it was generally agreed that the group would have to begin in a very small way with completely volunteer work, a wide variety of possibilities was discussed.

Prime thought was the provision of essential services to people in need of help including home nursing, homemakers, emergency help or temporary baby sitting, following a sudden accident or tragedy or prolonged illness.

A master list of women who are willing to canvass could be maintained. As it is, various groups make their own con-
