

Rookie Ralph Rintoul fires fine two-hitter as Villagers win 1-0

Campbellville unveiled their rookie right-hander, Ralph Rintoul in Hamilton last Wednesday night and he came through with a brilliant two-hit shut-out as he struck out ten, walked five and hit one batter over the seven inning route.

Rintoul had to be good as his team-mates only managed one run off Hamilton's right hander Hyrnick who held the league leaders to five hits. He struck out five and walked four.

The only run of the game came in the fifth when, with one out, Rick Repta singled. A pick-off throw from the pitcher got away from the first baseman and Repta went to second. He advanced to third on an infield out and scored when the pitcher balked. If Campbellville was fortunate to score this run they were unfortunate not to score in the first when Dredge failed to tag up on third on Cairns' long fly to centre-field with one out. In all Camp-

bellville left four men on third while only one Hamilton runner got that far.

Tambourini and Rosser singled for Hamilton. Ken Moore and Rick Repta each had two hits for Campbellville and Al Wingrove picked up the other.

Footnotes: Hamilton right-fielder Chiaral was hit in the face by a pitched ball in the fourth and was taken to hospital. When x-rays failed to reveal a fracture, he was released later in the evening.

Three times Hamilton attempted to steal and each time catcher Al Wingrove threw the runners out. Campbellville broke even in this department being thrown out once and stealing once.

From this room, entrance is possible to a small storage place and the furnace room. This houses two gas furnaces and the power concept, complete with circuit breakers. Provision has been made for air conditioning when funds are available.

The chief librarian and members of her board were very patient and answered our innumerable queries.

The heating cost of the complex, which has a floor area of 40 x 90' approximately, is about \$65 per month. A staff of two full-time and three part-time librarians make the library facilities available to the public for 25 1/2 hours each week — 2 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. and 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. Tuesdays to Fridays and 2 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. Saturdays.

The board room is made available, on a rent-free basis, to local service clubs or other activities.

A small kitchen attached to the cultural hall permits light refreshment if required.

To sum up, the visit was most profitable and we saw an achievement of which the citizens of Strathroy can be very proud.
