

# Heavy equipment school starts in Nassagaweya

A "heavy equipment operators course" — the first one of its type in Ontario — officially started last week at a Sixth Line site in Nassagaweya Township.

Ten-week courses in the operation of many types of heavy equipment will be offered at the school, which is a joint project of the Ontario Department of Education and the Ontario Road Builders' Association.

Trainees from anywhere in the province will be eligible to apply for the course, but the first one is already filled to capacity. S. A. Norton of the Administration and Technical Centres Branch of the Ontario Department of Education reports persons interested in taking future courses should contact the school's principal C. C. Lloyd at the Provincial Institute of Trades and Occupations, 37 Darnell Avenue, Toronto.

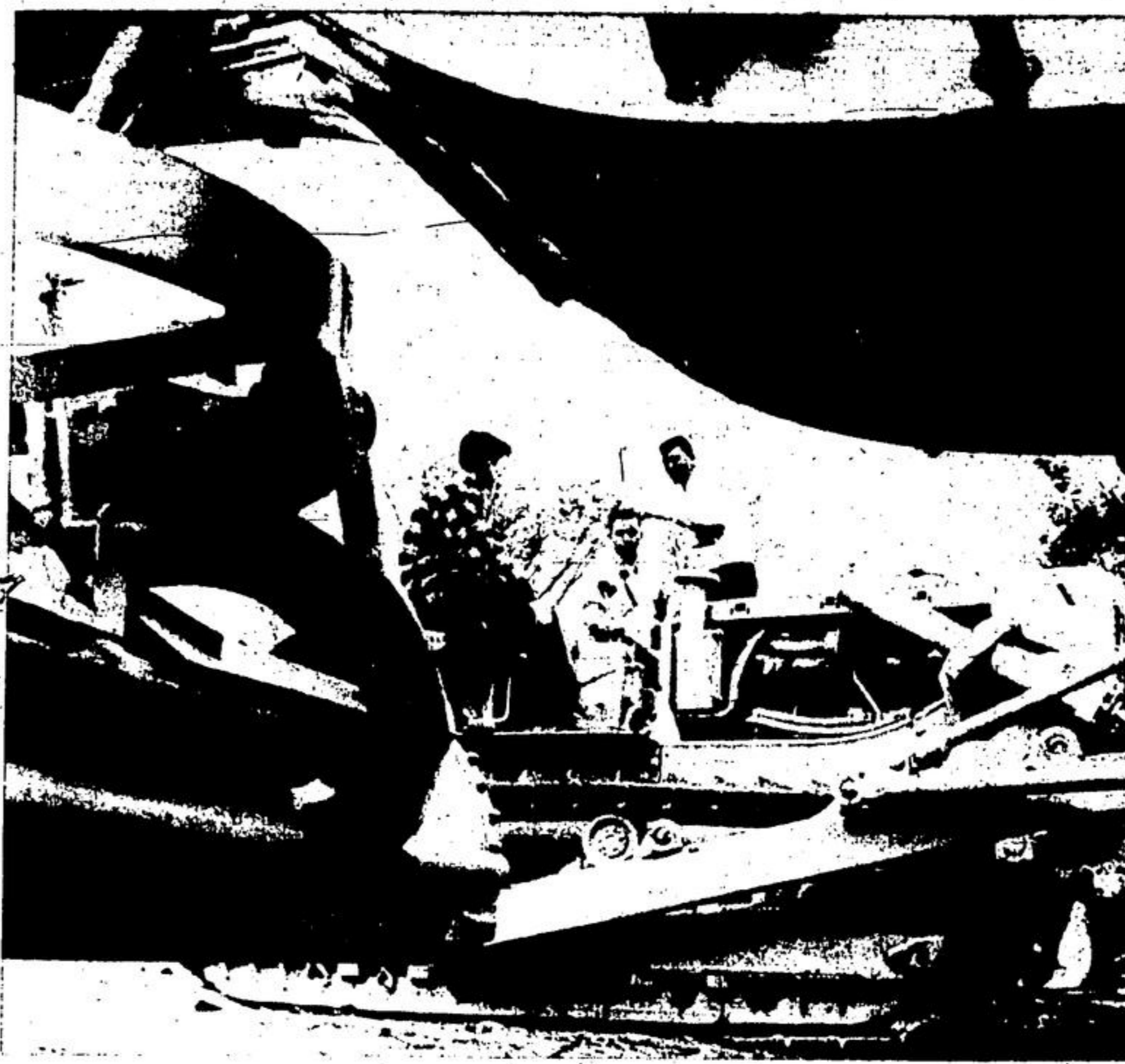
At the first course two instructors will look after a maximum of 16 trainees but Mr. Norton said the school would expand without hesitation if, in the future, there was enough interest to merit an expansion program. "We're adopting a wait and see attitude to start with," he said.

At least a dozen pieces of heavy equipment — all loaned by the Ontario Road Builders' Association — will be used in the first course. Some of the equipment to be used includes graders, caterpillars, front-end loaders and scrapers.

It is possible that newcomers to the heavy equipment industry might be subsidized by Program 5 — the provincial government's adult education program — but for the most part it is expected the matter of wages will be strictly between the trainee and the company he works for.

A large new building has been erected on the Sixth Line site by the Ontario Road Builders' Association where some equipment will be stored and where repairs will be made.

## Nassagaweya Council Briefs

At their regular council meeting on Monday evening, members of Nassagaweya Township Council:

- Agreed to purchase a used traffic counter valued at \$71.85, subject to the approval of the Department of Highways. The counter will be used on township roads.
- Approved a suggestion by road superintendent Grant McMillan that two sections of gravel road in the township be surface treated to cut down on the maintenance cost. He explained that where gravel sections of road meet hard-topped sections, especially on grades, it is difficult to maintain. Cost of surface treating the two sections — the Nassagaweya - Esquesing Town Line from the Milton Heights corner down to the bridge, and a section of about 900 feet at the railway crossing by the 401 overpass, south of Campbellville, would be about \$675.
- Approved road accounts totalling \$5,796.45.
- Received an invitation from the North Halton Urban Board to attend a meeting with a representative of the Ontario Water Resources Commission and Halton M.P.P. George Kerr in Georgetown on June 22.
- Received and approved a resolution from the Township Planning Board stating no definite plan of subdivision for the township should be accepted until the township's official plan is adopted.
- Heard Reeve William Coulter suggest, "I think in all fairness, we should deal with small gravel pit licenses in the near future." Licenses for several small gravel pits have been held for several months without any action being taken. The

mopane windows rather than single glass. The second, variable concern is the extra cost of the installation of an air conditioning unit. The third area for decision will be the cost of wall-to-wall carpet in place of vinyl asbestos tile on the floors. Terrazzo tile will be used in the entrance foyer and on the steps leading to both floor levels of the building. Ceiling height in the lower level will be nine feet and in the upper area 10 feet.

Councillor Oakes' question of the architect brought the information that painting of the building was included in the tender. Mr. Skinner answered council the tender was for a completed building including the check-in desk but not any furniture, furnishings or library equipment.

Reeve Hinton recommended the Centennial Committee proceed immediately with the planning of the bridge and landscaping so that any local service organizations would have the opportunity to undertake this work as a club project.

All members of council were present. Mayor Duby, reeve Hinton, deputy-reeve Parker, councillors Fryer, Drinkwater, Williams, Oakes, Leatherland and Masales with Joe Hurst acting as clerk and the architect in attendance. The vote on the motion to call tenders was unanimous.
